Lent at First Lutheran: Hymns of Our Faith

In 1538, Martin Luther was asked to write an introduction to Wittenburg musician and printer, Georg Rheau's

hymnbook. In it he famously penned this line: "next to the Word of God, music deserves the highest praise." You who love music and Luther have likely heard it quoted before. Yet Luther's accolades were not just on account of the pure beauty witnessed in listening to good music or the delightfully creative act involved in making it. For Luther and likewise for many in the faith, the gift of music is most highly valued because it can carry the proclamation of the good news of Jesus Christ in such a unique, heartfelt, and memorable way. And while not all may agree on what makes music good (are you more partial to Hank Williams or the "William Tell Overture"?), who doesn't love good music?

In the vein of good music of many styles, the Church has much to share. The treasure trove that has been created and shared over the generations of the Christian faith is the song or hymnody of the Church. Church music and hymns carry the beloved words of scripture and faith in a way that you can take with you—in your ear and in your heart. And

when we have such good news to share about the forgiveness of sins—the death and new life Jesus brings to us-how could we keep it to ourselves? Lutheran musician and professor Paul Westermeyer writes: "In Christ God has won the victory. Those who know it are compelled to sing."2 Or in the words of Robert Lowry's hymn, "My Life Flows On in Endless Song" (ELW 763): "No storm can shake my inmost calm while to the Rock I'm clinging. Since Christ is Lord of heaven and earth, how can I keep from singing?" If you know that hymn, you probably couldn't help but sing the words when you read them just now! That is the power of music and yoked in service to God's Word of perfect promise in Jesus Christ it is a truly heavenly duet.

This Lenten season, First Lutheran has the beautiful opportunity to explore the hymnody of the Church more deeply. Our Lenten theme for 2024 is "Lent at First Lutheran: Hymns of Our Faith." Beginning on Ash Wednesday (February 14) and following Wednesdays, we will gather for midweek Lenten worship services at 11:15 a.m. and 6:30 p.m. After a special Ash Wednesday service, our weekly worship setting will be the Holden Evening Prayer Service. Our preaching will focus on a different hymn of the church each week and scripture readings related to that hymn. Our Lenten devotions will connect you with a Luther

House of Study podcast on hymnody, "Sing to The Lord," crafted each week by Zachary Brockhoff (Director of Music Ministries at FLC), Mason VanEssen (FLC member and Chair of the Stewardship Board), and Lars Olson (Director of Pastoral Formation at Luther House of Study). And in a churchly version of March Madness bracketology, we will be sponsoring a favorite hymn of FLC bracket, starting with 64 of your favorite church hymns, utilizing your voting each week to arrive at the "champion hymn" of the faith by Holy Week. Of course, we know and trust that Christ is truly the champion of all and the reason we must sing to begin with.

We are excited to be brought into the season of Lent with the good news of Christ in our ears and hearts and on our lips. We're thankful to discover together the treasure of Christ through scripture and hymnody. Please submit the names of your favorite hymns as we have fun exploring favorite hymns of the congregation. And through it all, let me tell you once again that Christ comes for you this Lent to make you perfect in his death and resurrection alone. Knowing that, how can we keep from singing?



Beginning February 14, keep track of your steps/miles walked, run, or biked

February Special Offering – Local Missions

Many of our neighbors within the Sioux Falls community face the reality of what it is like to be homeless. The increasing numbers include adults and children, both sheltered and unsheltered. The focus for February's special offering centers on three local missions within our community that provide a variety of crisis support to adults and children who are experiencing poverty, homelessness, and other conditions that create challenges for adults and children in crisis.

Union Gospel Mission

Union Gospel Mission has been present in Sioux Falls since 1900 and provides spiritual nourishment, housing, meals,

clothing, and household items to individuals in need in our community. The Mission provides safe, comfortable lodging and showers for individuals who find themselves without shelter and needing a place to

rest and get out of the elements. Guests might be transients passing through the area; some are people struggling as they work to get back on their feet, and a few others are individuals who choose to join the UGM discipleship program and become accountable in several areas of their life. Lodging is offered for up to 80 men and 48 women and children. In addition to providing three meals a

day, UGM provides daily chapel, adult learning, medical care, and more. During 2023, the UGM provided 30,565 nights of shelter to men, women, and children; provided 148,065 meals and 18,000 hours of case management; and served 125 guests nightly. Bishop Dudley Hospitality House

Bishop Dudley Hospitality House is an ecumenical ministry in Sioux Falls that provides a central, first-stop resource for those in crisis. Bishop Dudley Hospitality House offers daytime and overnight emergency shelter for those who find

themselves homeless and vulnerable, providing housing for 80 men, 20 women, and



7 families nightly. Their programming serves the holistic needs of the individual. The Bishop Dudley House has a

maximum capacity of 155 overnight guests. They offer a warm, safe, secure place to start the road back to a more stable, long-term way of living.
