Confidentiality and Discernment Process

All candidates and congregations enter the call process with the expectation that their privacy will be respected. This expectation is not unique to churches; everyone seeking a position with a new employer



does so confidentially. The confidentiality expectation is founded on trust, a key element of the pastor congregation partnership. When confidentiality is violated, the willingness and ability of the candidates and the congregation to engage

in and maintain a trusting relationship are called into question. Candidates may withdraw from the call process, or the Call Committee may find it difficult to trust candidates.

It is of the highest importance that the Call Committee observe complete confidentiality throughout the execution of their corresponding responsibilities in the call process. The reason for confidentiality is to protect the candidates, the congregations they are serving, and most certainly our congregation in the call process. If a congregation currently being served by a candidate becomes aware that their pastor is seeking another call, their partnership will most likely be compromised in some way.

The problems caused by loose lips during the call process are numerous and quite frankly never end well. A breach of confidentiality has caused pastors to be forced to leave their current call as their congregation felt that trust was broken and could not be repaired. The devastation is not limited to just the pastor and their current congregation, as the anger and disgust get shared by that congregation's members, and it is typically hurled at members of the calling congregation leaders and its members.

Confidentiality rules which are to be observed are as follows:

The Call Committee will not share information about any candidate with anyone outside of the committee (this includes family members, spouses, executive committee members, and church council members). The ONLY exception to this rule is the chosen candidate when presented to the church council. The Church Council will not share information about the candidate recommended by the Call Committee until they decide to present the candidate

to the congregation for consideration and

ultimately a vote.

The Congregation will not seek to gain information about candidates from the Call Committee or the Church Council during the interview stage. When the Church Council recommends a candidate to the congregation for consideration for the call, confidentiality ceases, but not before.

Any member of the Call Committee who knowingly violates confidentiality will be excused from the Committee and will be replaced by an alternate. Any member of the Church Council who violates confidentiality will recuse himself/herself from further involvement in the call process. Also, any candidate who violates confidentiality shall be removed from the call process. These steps are necessary to ensure confidence in the commitment of the congregation and the candidates to confidentiality.

Beginning now, the Ministry Site Profile (MSP) will be the focus of our newly formed Call Committee. Completing and submitting the MSP is needed for potential • What do residents of Sioux Falls and the candidates to confidentially learn about First Lutheran and its Ministry. Prior to

completing the MSP, the call committee will seek input from the congregation to ensure they can accurately represent the Church's direction going forward. One of the final questions on the MSP asks about the Discernment Process used by the Call Committee. Before starting to work

on the MSP, the call committee and the entire congregation should spend time in discernment. We all should pray about our sense of Mission at this time.

- What is First Lutheran clearly good at and should continue?

before us in our community. Ministry that attempts to "do as much as possible" but barely touches one or two key needs of the community will not serve our congregation or community well. Truly, your prayerful discernment is key to getting this right. In my heart, I just know we will be led!

Meals on Wheels

Have you ever felt isolated, helpless, alone, or depressed about not being able to go out of your home for even basic necessities for days or weeks on end? Many of us experienced these emotions during the worst of



COVID 19. Fortunately, most of us have put that behind us and we are now getting on with our pre-COVID lives in one way or another.

But for many seniors (60 and older) and disabled in our community, these are permanent conditions. They live alone, are homebound for medical or social reasons, perhaps unable to prepare healthy meals for themselves. Can you imagine the joy and relief that comes five day a week when a friendly face delivers a hot, nutritious noon meal and maybe a minute or two of

conversation—perhaps about our crazy weather or more personally how they are doing.

First Lutheran is privileged to deliver these meals with a human touch through the Meals on Wheels program. Currently, 31 members (and often their "sidekicks") drive and deliver meals to 12-16 homebound seniors living in the northwest part of Sioux Falls. Members commit to drive one weekday a month (about two hours), and a list of substitutes will volunteer to take the route if something comes up or a scheduled driver is unable to make deliveries.

Seniors need the services of Meals on Wheels for many reasons—some permanently but others just to get over a "rough patch" in their lives like a fall, a recent health issue or treatment, loss of a spouse or a disabled spouse needing extra care, chronic debilitating health concerns, or any number of situations making it difficult or impossible to get out for groceries or other necessities. And, some are able to stay in their homes only with the help of Meals on Wheels.

Joyfully, the members of First Lutheran

Church give—bringing a needed hot

nutritional meal, a day brightener, and a little social interaction at each of their stops. Usually these drivers and/ or their helpers are the only person these homebound seniors see every day, so they look forward to that welcome knock on the door Monday through Friday. But it is not just the recipients of these meal who benefit. Indeed, the volunteers

meal who benefit. Indeed, the volunteers "are blessed to be a blessing," and they receive joy and a "warm, fuzzy" feeling as they make their deliveries to doors that open with a smile and a word of thanks. To quote the nutrition director of Active Generations where meals are prepared and packaged, "People think it's just delivering meals, but really it changes your heart." A volunteer driver for nearly 20 years puts it this way: "When I get done delivering the meals, I feel so good. It's good for them, but I feel so uplifted. Jesus says those who are merciful receive mercy. That's what happens each time I deliver."

If you have two hours a month to donate to this worthwhile ministry, please call the church and leave your name and contact info with the receptionist. You will be blessed beyond measure.


wrap the quilt around them. Then you watch as they whisper a quick blessing in their ear. It's so lovely.


