The Wind of the Holy Spirit

As the month of May breezes into the month of June, we in the Church are also brought from the season of Easter to Pentecost. This year on the Day of

Pentecost, (which is always on a Sunday since it is 49 days after Easter Sunday), our Gospel reading is from John 20:19-23. It's when Jesus finds the disciples on the night of Easter: They're all huddled up in the locked house, and Jesus tells them: "peace be with you." Then he breathes on them and says: "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

If that sounds familiar, that is because we also heard it on the second Sunday in the season of Easter. This story is so important that we hear it twice, and I suspect that is because we so often overlook the central foundation of what Jesus is giving not only to the disciples, but to the whole

Church, including you! He gives them the authority to forgive sins through the Holy Spirit. On that day of Pentecost, we see the church grow as the Word of God is preached, and the Holy Spirit gives faith to 3,000 people! The message was based in the authority given the disciples and you: to forgive the sins of any. That authority was the foundation of the early church, and it is the foundation of the Church today as well. As we tackle all sorts of challenges and questions on a congregational level here at First Lutheran, know that this forgiveness of sins in Christ alone is our foundation. It is the basis for all that we do, by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Does it ever seem like we are the disciples huddled up in the locked house, with the news of Jesus' resurrection? Well, just as Jesus showed up to the disciples, so too does he come to you. Knowing that He is here, giving the same authority, we are freed to embark in all sorts of ways to share this Word, assured that the Word accomplishes that which it sets out to do.

With our ministry site profile completed and approved by the Church Council,

our Call Committee has been busy searching and researching names of potential associate pastors to interview. We have a promising list and are open to suggestions from the congregation. The call committee is also looking at the possibility of calling an associate pastor outside the job description of Youth and Family Pastor if the interviewee would be a good fit for FLC—while continuing our search for a youth and family pastor.

Our staff and Youth and Family Board have also been working hard not only finishing up the program year with Confirmation, Sunday School, Wednesday School, and Youth Group, but reimagining our youth and family ministry and interviewing and filling two important staff roles in this ministry area.

Where the Word God is preached and the sacraments given—there is the Church. There is the Holy Spirit being breathed on you, giving faith as your sins are forgiven. People of First Lutheran, this is our foundation and our hope. Peace be with you!

Pastor Chris Matson Church on the Street


It is our mission at Church on the Street to take the gifts of the church out to the people who, for whatever reason, cannot come inside. The ministry is

their beautiful quilts made by our FLC Quilters!



God's Grace: Our Heritage and Future

Well, it is my hope that the reception desk will be completed by the time you read this article. We had a small "oops" the

day the stone was delivered. The crew from the stone company dropped the piece that faces west, so that piece needed to be replaced. Thankfully, the stone company had to replace it, and there is no additional cost to the church.

Here's what's is happening on the roofs:

The Tower Entrance roof is going to be fixed. The bid was signed, and we are on the schedule at ARS.

The Atrium roof had four spots that were repaired. ARS, the roofing company, has indicated we could get 3-4 more years out of the Atrium roof. This time frame is dependent on the type of winters we have in the next 3-4 years.

The Chapel Roof had one area of concern, and it was repaired.

The roof above the Pentecost room has an area that needs to be replaced. ARS is

sending us a bid for that work.

The north balcony of the Sanctuary is a concern. There is an area where two parts of the building connect to form a V. There are snow guards in this area. During the winter, ice built up and pushed the snow guards into the corner and created a hole. The church is waiting for a bid on this area of the roof. The property board is aware of all of the issues with the roof and is working to see how all the issues can be resolved. The roof issues are not officially part of the capital campaign.

Now, onto the steeple that is an official part of the capital campaign. A big thanks to Jeff Hartnett for climbing into the steeple and taking pictures of the interior. The interior of the steeple is solid; it is the exterior that has issues. I was looking for someone to use a drone to take pictures of the exterior of the church steeple as well as the entire roof. This went out to people on staff involved in the building operations. Thanks to Jodi Hoyt for knowing a member who had a drone and was willing to come and take lots of pictures. Thanks to Mike Gray for being the member willing to give of his time with his drone. If you see these individuals in passing, please be sure to express your thanks as well. A general contractor will need to be found to do the work on the steeple, and then the slate on the roof will be handled

by a roofing company.

Sound system: The sound system group had a meeting with the sound system design company on May 12. Pastor Jason, Iames Moore, Dave Palmer, Zachary Brockhoff, and I attended the Zoom meeting. Some changes are being made to the design, and we are hopeful to get the final design in three weeks. Once the design is approved, then the bid process will start. The bid process is around 30 days. Then equipment will need to be ordered by the company that won the bid. The delivery of the equipment is one of the bigger questions. The congregation will be kept up to date as to the time frame as we find out more information.

Furniture: There has been some concern about the furniture that has been reupholstered or purchased for the Gathering Room, Atrium, and Welcome Center. This money has come from designated accounts that are outside of the capital campaign and general church operating budget. No money from the campaign or church budget has been used to purchase furniture or pay to have any furniture reupholstered. Your concern for money being spent wisely is appreciated.

The church would so appreciate your continued prayers for the capital campaign.
