Greetings brothers and sisters in Christ at First Lutheran. I write to you from family camp in July at Mount Carmel on Lake Carlos, Alexandria, MN. For over 13 years, Erin and I, and eventually our kids, have joined other families for a week of Bible Camp together at Mount Carmel. These weeks have provided many gifts: time spent together being surrounded by biblical preaching and teaching, wonderful programming for the kids, and a beautiful lake setting. I'd love to talk more about the family camp experience to anyone who would like to know more.

The teaching topic for adults at family camp this year at Mount Carmel is Jesus' parables. This is a welcome pump primer for preaching and hearing some upcoming Gospel readings. In our worship life together at First Lutheran this month of August, we will hear Gospel readings

from Matthew chapters 14 and 15. The first verse of the first reading we hear on August 5 and 6 is Matthew 14:13—it tells of Jesus' attempt to get away by himself on a boat. On the surface it sounds much like what we all try to do in the fleeting months of summer—to get away.... perhaps even on a boat. Maybe this month you are planning one last getaway before school starts or the nights start getting cooler. In Jesus' case, however, he does not get the solitude he seeks at the lake (Galilee). First, Jesus is followed by the haunting news of John the Baptist's death. The phrase "after Jesus heard this" at the beginning of the verse refers to the news that John the Baptist (Jesus' cousin) has just been beheaded by Herod for his preaching the truth about Herod's sin. Second, Jesus is followed by many of the people from the surrounding towns. They like what they hear and want more from the one who preaches with a new authority.

So even this one Jesus Christ, who has all authority over sin and death, had to endure the reality of his cousin's death and the demand of the people he was to save. It was in this context that after a long day of preaching, Jesus found himself surrounded by 5,000 hungry people and only five loaves a bread and two fish. That

day, Jesus fed over 5,000 people.

Perhaps you've found restful retreat and wonderful escape this summer. Or perhaps you feel like the things of this life keep following you around, like there is never enough time to get everything on your list done, let alone take time off. I can tell you that this summer and this week at Mount Carmel have felt like both.

Yet as we anticipate and prepare for the many upcoming opportunities to be gathered around God's Word, to learn and make music this fall, I want you to know that God does not wait for you to get everything done on your list, or even for you to be fully rested before he comes to you with his gifts. For that hungry crowd he gave a miraculous meal—one that did not seem likely at all. For you there is something even better—it is a meal of Jesus' body and blood and an overflowing basket of his forgiveness. As unlikely as this may seem to you—it is yours. We will gather around this Word often in worship, Sunday and Wednesday School, Confirmation, Bible Studies, in Choir School, various musical groups, and fellowship opportunities. Please continue to keep in prayer the work of our staff, volunteers, our call process, and staff openings, as we are called to proclaim Christ's death for the sake of sinners.

Call to Freedom opened their doors in March of 2016. They are a non-profit organization here in Sioux Falls that provides supportive services to victims of human trafficking and sexual exploitation by creating a strong network of frontline providers who offer safe housing, mental health counseling, medical assistance, chemical dependency services, transportation, and other supportive services.

Human trafficking is the illegal trade of human beings, mainly for the purposes of forced labor and sex trafficking. As the world's fastest growing criminal industry, it affects every country and every state in the United States. Every 30 seconds, someone becomes a victim of modern-day

Human trafficking generally takes the form of forced labor or sex or commercial

sexual exploitation. Victims are targeted through the use of force, or are lured by fraud, manipulation, or coercion. Unfortunately, many victims simply never leave, or they end up disappearing. Those

June FLC Council Updates

Parental Leave Policy

Michael discussed the presented parental leave policy that the Exec. Committee approved for presentation to the council. Lori W. and Jaci A. have some style and form changes that will be addressed before implementation. Discussion was opened on the policy, which provides for six weeks of paid parental leave for employees who become parents through birth, surrogacy, or adoption. Deb N. asked if the six weeks needed to be taken consecutively, and the intent is that no, it does not need to be taken consecutively but does need to be arranged with the immediate supervisor, per the policy. Colin B. asked where the six weeks came from and if it was industry standard, and it was discussed that this comes from the SD Synod recommendation. Lola C. asked if this is part of the MSP, and Pr. Jason said it was not a formal part of the MSP but could

come about in conversation and reflect positively on FLC.

Deb N. moved to approve the parental leave policy, as amended, seconded by Lola C. Approved unanimously.

Capital Campaign Fund Misallocation

Michael presented that we are closer to having a full, accurate number for the amount misallocated. It is likely to fall within the \$180,000-200,000 range, but this is not finalized. The Financial Oversight Committee (FOC) will be brought in to review the process, along with the auditors, to confirm the numbers are accurate and to ensure the process is remedied going forward. Randy and Michael will be meeting with the FOC on Monday.

Synod Assembly Recap

Pr. Jason presented on the Synod Assembly. He indicated that among the council, Deb N. was present. The theme was Cultivate. Nothing significant/ dramatic was up for a vote. Ministries were advertised and the budget was approved for the SD Synod. Next year's assembly will be in Rapid City, which happens every few years. Pr. Jason indicated that Lutherans Outdoors presented that one of the camp weeks at Outlaw Ranch is for LGBTQ-identifying kids, and some of the rhetoric used toward people with differing opinions was concerning. Deb N. discussed the session she attended on rural ministries and the struggles those congregations have with getting pastors to come to those communities, where they might serve more than one congregation.

While FLC is not a rural ministry, Deb realized that those churches have to be

strong and keep their youth engaged. Those youth are likely to come to Sioux Falls, so it is certainly important for us to understand this issue and its relation to our congregation in the future.

Youth & Family Positions/ Communications

Pr. Jason expressed his delight to have Val Pherson on staff. He said that he and Val and some interim help has been instrumental in keeping the program moving in the right direction. Val has moved into the role of Youth & Family Team Lead. We now are looking for an office coordinator and an individual largely focusing on children's ministry, with some overlap in other Youth & Family areas. They are also grateful for the help of two summer interns, Mollie Brown and Lauren Williams. Val's biggest request is for prayer that we find the right people to help share the Gospel with our youth. Val is excited to see the plans she has for the next year start to be put into place. She feels like even if the positions are not immediately filled, she is confident they can still do ministry well for FLC. Sunday morning will look similar to this year. Sunday school will be between services but for a shorter period of time, after having snack/fellowship time with family. On Wednesdays, starting at 6:30 p.m., after the optional meal, it will begin with a worship service and then follow with classroom work 7-7:30 p.m. The focus will be the Small Catechism. Kristin S. presented that the Y&F board will work to support Pr. Jason and Val and engage others who are interested in helping in the area even if they don't have children in that age group.

Pr. Jason Out of Office Plans

Pr. Jason's family has moved into their home this month, and he is looking forward to some time off this summer. He will be gone for four weeks total this summer, generally one week on, one week off. Coverage for preachers is arranged,

as well as pastoral care. One of the other weeks will be continuing education at Mt. Carmel family camp. Preachers include Chris Croghan, supported by Val; Sarah Stenson, supported by Bob Chell; and Bob O'Connor.

Directories Update

Deb N. said the Welcome & Community board wants to do another church directory this year. A couple of businesses have contacted us with interest. One is an older, traditional format that sells packages of pictures. Lifetouch is no longer in business. The other business has a different model that relies on FLC to take the pictures, which can come from anywhere, and then they put them into a paper directory, and we can determine the information we want to be included. FLC can also place these online in Planning Center. She anticipates going with the newer model option, but it has not been decided yet by the board. She will keep the council updated. Lola C. asked if individuals who do not have a picture would be able to have someone from FLC work with them, and Deb said they would have to work that out.

Financial Report

Randy O. presented that net, we are \$61,000 better, even with the \$148,000 misallocated. Chris N. asked if there was a surplus last year, and Randy said there was \$121,852 last year, but it was applied to this year's budget. Randy has no concerns about revenue and said it is coming in even better than projected on a seasonally adjusted basis. We will still need the historic big November and December giving in order to have this trend continue.

Executive Committee Report

In addition to items that were on the Council agenda, Michael updated us that the Washington Pavilion issue with school buses using our parking lot was remedied through a positive meeting with Darin Smith. These buses will not be parked in

our lot anymore, after we presented a map that has been provided to these drivers from Washington Pavilion staff, indicating our lot was a recommended place to park. The discussion was positive and one of partnership, and Michael offered that in a pinch, with 48 hours' notice, we would be happy to accommodate when possible. Darin indicated they have other parking arrangements that will be used and that a new map would be developed.

Pastor Jason Updates

Pr. Jason presented on the email scam that hit some members of FLC. Staff is looking into it and is trying to address it at church services and as inquiries are made. He reminded everyone again that "sending" email addresses should be checked carefully every time. He also updated the council on the call committee process. The Synod has provided some names and they found candidates in other ways as well. He feels they could have a couple strong possibilities. He requested prayers to continue for this process. He said the number of baptisms have been picking up even with one happening today during the staff devotional service. He pointed out that Mason and Andrea Van Essen welcomed baby Crosby recently! He also mentioned that the staff is hoping to celebrate the Atrium remodel completion on Sunday, July 30.

Other Business

Colin B. indicated that the Finance, Property, and Administration board has an individual who would not be completing their term and inquired as to what they should do to fill that term. Lyle E. indicated he thinks a name should be presented to council and the nominating committee could be of assistance. Colin will see if there are names that would be interested in serving. Even without filling the position, there are still eight remaining members.

The Council (and many boards) will not meet in July.

Capital Campaign Update

The roof projects are complete. The church is thankful to Colin Barron (Finance, Administration, and Property Board

Chair), Jeff Hartnett, and Kent Wilson for the help they provided on this project and to ARS.

The sound system is coming along. Members of the congregation have wondered what is taking so much time. The owner of the sound design company had a heart attack, and that set the process back a few months. We are thankful that the sound designer has had a full recovery. The church is especially grateful to Dave Palmer and the broadcast team

members for the work they have done looking at cameras and the placement of them. Dave has also been instrumental in working with the sound designer on changes that will benefit First Lutheran. The last hurdle was trying to locate a place in the sanctuary for the subwoofers. Dave Palmer worked with Jeff Harnett on this part of the project. By the time you read this article, the hope is that the bids will be in process. The team from the church including Zachary Brockhoff, James Moore, Pastor Jason, and Dave Palmer will review the bids and will make a recommendation of which company to award the bid for the sound system.

Currently, the cost of the equipment will be \$240,000, and we have all the funds for the equipment in the Capital Campaign sound system account. The cost might vary a bit depending on any changes that are noted now in the design after the review of the cameras and placement of the subwoofers.

The Chapel will also receive an updated sound system. Whether you worship on Saturday in the Chapel or Sunday in the Sanctuary, every member will be impacted by this digital sound system.

The next question asked by members is "When will the sound system be completed?" At the annual meeting I indicated I hoped by October. However, realistically, it might not be completed until sometime in November but certainly before Christmas.

The church is grateful to the members who designated their gifts to this fund of the Capital Campaign. Please continue your prayers for our church and the improvements that will enhance your worship experience in both word and music, through the new sound system.
