Calling all Resolutionists! It is a New Year!

"So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!"

- 2 Corinthians 5:17

I do not think I am the only one excited to see us turn the page on the year 2020. As I am writing this, the COVID-19 vaccine is starting to be administered,

and there seems to be hope that we are turning a major corner with the pandemic. The presidential election is pending the electoral college vote. There is no doubt that this last year has shaped us to be a new people, how we interact with each other, how we work, and how we play.

The turn of the calendar to a new year brings with it anticipation for what can be possible. Often, we find that people make all kinds of plans to improve themselves or aspects of their life. Gym memberships usually see an increased spike, self-help book sales increase, people begin new hobbies or even make plans to alter major parts of their life like their occupation, people move to new homes, and the like.

New Year's also brings a renewed emphasis on the church season of Epiphany, which is known as the season of light. The underlying message of epiphany is God's revealing of Christ to the world. The date of January 6 has historically brought the time of Christmastide to a close and is traditionally celebrated as the day of the visitation of the Magi to the Christmas family at Bethlehem (Matthew 2:1-12). The Magi were "wise men" from the East and were Zoroastrian Priests, meaning they looked to the stars for signs or messages. They were the ones who followed the star of Bethlehem as the sign that the Christ had been born. This is just one of the ways God revealed his Son had come into the world to dwell among us.

It is the first Sunday after Epiphany that becomes important for our knowing, as we celebrate the baptism of our Lord by John in the river Jordan. It is in this event that God reveals the true nature of why he sent his Son into the world. After John the Baptist had continually preached the message of the one who is coming, Jesus walks up to him on the shore of the Jordan River. Jesus tells John that he must be baptized by him, and John resists. But of course, John is dealing with God incarnate, so like he has any authority to resist

Jesus. John baptizes Jesus, and as Jesus is coming out of the water, we hear that the heavens are torn open, and the Holy Spirit alights on Christ as God speaks, "This is my Son, my beloved, in whom I am well pleased."

But why is it important that Jesus is baptized? Who is baptism for?

Well for us, as sinners, it is in this event that the promise that comes in Christ is being founded. From this point forward, Jesus takes on your sins, your actual sins. Not as a sign, not as a payment of some sort of debt. Jesus must take on your actual sin in order to take it to the cross and to die for it. Because, if there was any other way for you to be made right with God, the cross is not only diminished, but is invalidated.

The great message of Epiphany is this: Christ came into the world as the light of God that breaks through the darkest parts of our lives. As a New Year people, let the revelation of Christ and why he has come speak into your life today because the only great potential you have is in Christ Jesus. We know that common resolutions wither away, but the resolution of Christ is to send the Holy Spirit to you again and again, to speak his promises of forgiveness, and that makes you a new creation when you trust in it. This is the good news of epiphany! The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness does not overcome it.

Happy Epiphany to you all!

January Special Offering: Companion Synods

This month's special offering supports our companion synods in Nicaragua: Iglesia Luterana de Nicaragua Fe y Esperanza, ILFE (The Nicaraguan Lutheran Church of Faith and Hope), and in Cameroon: L'Eglise Evangélique Luthérienne au Cameroun, EELC (The Evangelical Lutheran Church of Cameroon).

I am happy to share my with you my experiences traveling to Nicaragua and Cameroon to work alongside the Lutheran Church in both countries. I have traveled to Nicaragua on four separate occasions with a medical mission group, working in conjunction with ILFE, providing care to those in rural Nicaragua as well as people in the capital city of Managua. What a privilege it has been to go and be the hands of God working in His world!

While many see this as a call to give financially to God (which is exactly what I'm asking you to consider!), I also believe it is a call to give of our individual time and talents! In Colossians, Luke is referred to as a physician (from the Greek for "one who heals"). As a medical professional, Luke's words resonate in my heart as well as in the work of my hands.

In February 2017, I traveled to Cameroon with Bishop Zellmer and a delegation of nurses and advance practice providers from the South Dakota Lutheran Synod, partnering with Global Health Ministries, to provide medical supplies and education to three hospitals in the Adamawa Region. Again, I looked to scripture, to Matthew 9:35-38, "Then Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues, and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom, and curing every disease and every sickness. When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest."

We traveled 16 hours by train from the capital in Yaoundé to N'Gaoundéré and Garoua-Boulaï, spent time at hospitals and rural clinics; worshiped together; embraced our brothers and sisters in Christ at the Leprosarium in Foubarka; met with seminarians at the Lutheran Institute of Theology in Meiganga; and shared prayers, conversations, and meals with those who Christ calls US ALL to love!

I'll leave you all with my favorite travel quote, attributed to Mark Twain: "Travel is fatal to prejudice, bigotry, and narrow-mindedness, and many of our people need it sorely on these accounts. Broad, wholesome, charitable views of men and things cannot be acquired by vegetating in one little corner of the earth all one's lifetime."

For the first time in 40 years, our November Bazaar had to be cancelled, and discussions began about how we might be able to fulfill some of the applications already received.

Hannah Circle opened up their garages, put on their masks, and with the help of many volunteers were able to contribute \$8,000 to the 2020 Bazaar Funds.

When we located a lefse maker, we put in an order, and Sharyl Wolf made a lefse run to North Dakota. We sold out the first order and immediately placed a second order. There are a few packages still for sale (it freezes well). That added another \$3,900 to the 2020 Bazaar Funds.

Knowing how generous the First Lutheran family is, we sent out a letter to all women of the congregation which to date has garnered another \$9,690

Because of the generosity of all, we were able to approve \$18,900 to missions in December. We have approximately \$3,500 in reserve to address needs during 2021. Following is a list of recipients of the \$18,900.

A Nunc Dimittis For The New Year

Dear family and friends of FLC: listenin to the following words of "comfort and joy" that continue the Christmas story in Luke, Chapter 2. They're words in the form of a song, sung by a patriarchal figure in the Jewish faith. And old, nearly blind man, named Simeon. All his life, Simeon had prayed

that he might live long enough to see the promised Messiah ... So now, as he enters the Temple in Jerusalem, in our gospel text ... there stands Mary and Joseph with the baby Jesus, ready to offer-up a sacrifice of thanksgiving to God for his birth. And at that very moment, the wings of the Holy Spirit alight upon Simeon, revealing to him that he is now looking into the very eyes of the long-awaited Messiah. And so, taking the baby Jesus in his arms, Simeon breaks into song:

"Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace, according to thy word; for mine eyes have seen thy salvation which thou hast prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel."

So here's a question to ponder: "Why, after all the festive celebrations of candlelight services, singing *Joy To The World*, the exchange of colorfully wrapped gifts, or some upon-the-roof-top highs with family or friends gathered 'round – which we are sore looking forward to again in this coming year – WHAT IN THE WORLD are we doing talking about death in this gospel text?!"

My friends ... in this year of 2020, covered by the dark pall of the Covid virus and all of its tragedies, I think we're in a much better place to understand the gravity, but also the grace of this story. For many of us know all too well how the loss of a loved one has made this Christmas Season particularly difficult. Reminded simply by the lighting of a candle, the singing of a stanza from a carol, or even the touch of a favorite ornament or the taste of a peppermint stick ... some fleeting memory of Christmas past. Well, guess what? Simeon's gotcha covered. He's no different than us, really. An old man now, around the block a number of times, he too has tasted love and lost, felt joy and despair, hope and fears. And so Simeon sings of death simply because he can't help himself; because he, like us, lives with death every day. But

This is more than merely stark realism. For St. Luke is clear that Simeon is able to speak of death so honestly only in the light of the coming of the promised Messiah; only, that is, by the confidence that in this little child, God has come to redeem Israel and save the world. (Note the mixtures of emotion in Rembrandt's painting of a now nearly blind Simeon, which is actually Rembrandt's self-portrait as an old man – painted just days before his death in 1669. Note also where the light is coming from in this painting. Hmm? Do you see it?

And suddenly, this side of Christmas, Simeon's peculiar yet confident song is also our own: "Lord now lettest thou thy sevants depart in peace; for your word has been fulfilled" ... for Christ, the Savior is born! Yes, Christ the Savior is born ... born FOR YOU and your salvation!!
