Communion Practice?

A Three part Series on Holy Communion: An Introduction

Now some 40 years ago, while attending Luther Theological Seminary in St. Paul, I would often be invited by Dr. Al Rogness (former Senior Pastor of First Lutheran, 1951-1954, and later,

President of Luther Seminary) to go for a stroll through the woods of St. Anthony Park. As we sauntered along a path, we'd often compare notes on our interests in literature and music, or our common backgrounds with Augustana College, family life, and days spent out under a big blue Dakota sky.

On one such occasion, I recall Al talking about how he was working on a little book regarding the understanding of Communion (cited below). He talked about how different was our time from when he was growing up in Astoria, South Dakota. He recalled how during his boyhood and even high school years, his congregation only celebrated Communion once a year or perhaps on a festival Sunday. Also, in preparation for this sacred occasion, his family was required on the Saturday prior to spend time with the pastor for personal Confession and Forgiveness. How different, he observed, is "communion practice" in the churches today from that of the early 1900s. Today most congregations have Holy Communion at least once a month, say nothing of every Sunday.

Where communicants come as they do today, without private confession and perhaps little preparation-often unaware that there is Communion until they enter the church doors-does the Lord's Supper become so casual that its sacred or solemn character becomes lost? Or, will renewed accent on the Sacrament lead to a diminished concern for the preaching of the Word? Moreover, is there any longer a spirit of humility or repentance that we carry to the communion rail, upon hearing the sheer gift of God's promise in Christ's Words of Institution: "This is my body given for you, my blood shed for you, for the forgiveness of sin"? Or are we just going through the motions? Has it become but a common practice among us that we no longer "remember" the profound meaning of what is meant by Christ's "real presence" in this sacrament, or is it but a sign or symbol? Yes, what really is going on here? What about this matter, this meaning when we feel Christ's touch that comes into our hands and lips, "in, with, and under" the uncommonly common elements of bread and wine? "Listen," says Jesus. "Here I am." "Here I am, in this bread and wine." "Yes, here I am for you-forgiving your sin and promising new life, in my name." Family and friends of First Lutheran, to draw upon the words of the well-beloved hymn: "Are we lost in awe and wonder?" ("Love Divine, All Loves Excelling" ELW #631)

These were the lead-in types of questions that prompted Dr. Rogness to write his little



book, The Table of the Lord (1982). And I hope that over the next three months we will be prompted as well.

It's a growth that we can draw upon with better wisdom that's been gained and can be drawn up in future decisions that we all need to make in life—especially those difficult ones.

our homes and comfort within our own shifting routines—an adaptational process if you will. Throughout all of these trying and testing days, we remember as the song that reminds us that "God is watching us ... always watching us" (Bette Midler). But not only "from a distance," as the song lyric continues. The Bible reminds us that God is always with us (Psalm 23:4; 46:1-7, 10; Matthew 28:20) ... especially in the very thick of things, as we look to Christ and his cross. Yes, these are times when we especially feel like we've been run over or stepped on. But again, I believe that ours is a time in which we are also especially called by God to seek his strength and wisdom that will better serve a fuller sense of purpose and meaning in our lives. And watch it grow and bear fruit! Perhaps we're given a somewhat rare opportunity in these "crazy times" to discover or find out what's truly important. Being able to find comfort and refuge in our shifting daily routines has been key. Our comfort (in our home) comes while breaking our daily bread and as we pray at night. Is God especially trying to use this time for "waking us up"? Waking us up to what is really important in life. Like spending more time in nurturing our faith, our family, and friends ... and our neighbor who is in need? Yes, God is indeed present in our lives, but perhaps he's stepping further into our day-to-day activities (perhaps even pulling on us a bit to grow?) and saying to each of us: "Here is how you got here, and here's where you can improve. Don't dread your days, but instead: take breaks, laugh, stop, and think about where you are and where you've been and what you want to see in the future."

Marathon and Century Ride Challenge

What a month it was! Seventy-six people made a commitment to run or walk a marathon of 26 miles or ride 100 miles on their bike from May 7 to May 27. Seventy-six people made the commitment to work on their physical and mental health during the pandemic month of May 2020.

It says in the book, Walking with Abraham and Sarah, that "both faith and healthy lifestyles are integral to the whole person." We did work on the whole person as we made this special journey.

A drawing for awards from all who met the challenge will be held later this summer and, hopefully, we can gather some Sunday in the fall. Congratulations to all.

Some interesting results from this journey:

• Seventy people met the challenge!

• The oldest was Don Toft at 93, and the youngest was Annika Smith at 8, who both completed the 100-mile century bike ride.

• 179 marathons were walked or run, and 11 century rides were completed.

• Four people did both marathons and century rides including Howard Bich, Emil Knapp, Adam Monson, and Birgit Peterson.

• The top performer on this journey was 16-year-old Adam Monson who ran/walked six marathons and completed three century rides in 21 days.

• Besides Adam, other notable performances were (all numbers are marathons except for Wayne Carney): Randy Balster 4.1, Wayne Carney 2 century rides, Roger Coon 4, Terry Cosand 4.5, Byron Hammerstram 4, Terese Hammerstram 4, Judy Leslie 4.9, Beth Monson 5.5, Paul Monson 4.7, Tracie Osthus 4.6, Sandra Pedersen 4, Blake Stark 4, Kris Stark 4, Nicholas Stark 5, Jill Steel 4, Dave Wilson 5.4, and Pam Schroeder 6.3. • Those meeting the challenge from the First Lutheran staff were Pastor John, Pastor Katherine, Jodi Hoyt, Jordan Stone, Heather Smith, and Dave Wilson.

• This was a fun challenge! It certainly boosted my incentive to kick it up a notch. I've never thought to translate my steps into miles into marathons.

• Needless to say, I took numerous trips up and down my hallway of my apartment building. I made over 400 trips up and down my apartment hallway.

• My goal is to keep it up for all times.

- Thanks for keeping us motivated.
- It's hard to realize that in three weeks, I could walk this many steps, and summer is just beginning.

• Exercise is so important for our mental and physical health, especially during this time being isolated.

Our "fun story" was discovering a turtle (about the size of a dinner plate) who was quite intent on crossing Veterans Hwy. (old Hwy. 11). He seemed safe at the time so we left him where he was. We thought we'd pick him up and move him to a safer place on our return walk. It took us about 30 minutes of walking before we reached the area where we'd last seen the turtle, and a car had pulled over. The driver was looking for him and not being sure of his intentions, we hesitated to tell him where our little friend was. We asked him if he was looking for the turtle, and he said yes, that he'd ridden by the turtle earlier on his bike and stopped to pick it up just before it was getting ready to walk onto the highway. He put it up in the grass where it would be safe until he could go home and get a pail to put it in. He was planning to take it to the valley across the highway where it might be safer. We showed him where the turtle was just as another couple on their bikes stopped and said, they too, had moved Mr. Turtle back to safety earlier, so they were glad someone else had taken the time to rescue it. We watched as the gentleman carried the turtle across the highway and gently placed him over the hill and toward the valley on the other side. It just shows the great kind of people there arecaring people who took time to look after a little turtle to keep him safe! With all the terrible news we hear about these days, I thought this gesture shows that there are still people with compassion for God's creation! So, John, thanks for the challenge, but I think I'm going to wait a few days before I start walking again! God bless you and continue to stay safe.


Grieving with Grace continues on Zoom[®] July 11


counselor in the summer of 2009.



Each July, the Evangelism and Outreach Board gives special

emphasis to recognizing our current seminary students. Our continual prayer is that the Holy Spirit would raise up good and faithful servants to go out into the world to preach the good news of Jesus Christ. And First Lutheran has been blessed. It is my understanding that FLC has sent more people through seminary than any other single congregation in the South Dakota Synod. As a part of that sending, the sponsoring congregation is also asked to help support the financial obligation of seminary and related expenses. She is finishing her required internship at St. John's American Lutheran Church in Sioux Falls and will be in assignment this fall to find out where she will be serving. Elias Johnson-Youngquist Hey! I'm Elias Johnson-Youngquist,

and I have been the youth minister at First Lutheran Church for almost three and a half years. I am currently wrapping up my third year of seminary at Sioux Falls Seminary with Luther House of Study and Luther Seminary.

This coming year I'll be tackling

some hours of hospital and home visits as a part of Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE), a portion of my education that requires a certain number of pastoral care hours. Should that all go according to plan, I'll do an internship in the spring of 2021 and wrap up with my seminary education by 2022.

This summer, in lieu of going on some of the great trips we do with youth ministry that have been canceled due to the COVID-19 crisis, I'll be taking an intensive distance class through Luther Seminary (a requirement for my education) on the history of American Christianity.

Descending from Liberia, Africa, Abraham spent many years living as a refugee in other west African countries after civil war erupted in Liberia in 1989. Abraham lived in Sierra Leone, the Republic of Guinea, and finally Nigeria. In 2006, Abraham began his theological studies at Bethel Institute of Theology and Biblical Research in Nigeria. At that time, First Lutheran supported Abraham, and in 2009, he received his bachelor's degree in Theology. Starting in 2011, Abraham would come once each year to the United States to visit his family in Sioux Falls.

In the fall of 2014, the Ebola virus crisis broke out in Liberia, and Abraham was granted a protection visa to



stay in the U.S. During that time, he began to take on a leadership role in the evolving First Lutheran African Ministry. This led to his attending Sioux Falls Seminary and Luther House of Study through the newly emerging Kairos program, working toward a Master of Divinity degree and seeking ordination in the ELCA. Abraham was entranced as a pastoral candidate in the South Dakota Synod in 2016.
