When is First Lutheran Church reopening to in-person worship and ministry?

We know there are numerous questions about when worship and programming activities will resume at First Lutheran Church. A task force is meeting to provide

recommendations to the church council about when and how our campus is once again busy with multiple ministries and worship services. Composed of FLC pastors, staff directors, and congregation members who are medical doctors or nurses, the re-opening task force held its first meeting on May 19, 2020. This sixteen-member group reviewed the most recent guidance from the Centers for Disease Control, government, the South Dakota Synod, and the ELCA about safe practices during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The primary goal of the task force is to develop a plan that minimizes the risk of infection for the First Lutheran, staff, and guests. We believe every person is valuable, and consequently, the recommendations from the task force are based upon evaluating a myriad of information rather than arbitrarily setting a date to re-open.

As of the writing of this article, community spread of the virus continues, albeit at a reduced rate. A peak in virus-related hospitalizations is still projected for the first half of June. Consequently, the task force recommended that in-person activities not resume during the month of May. The task force will reconvene on June 1, 2020, to consider updated information about the local rate of infections, hospitalizations, recovery rates, availability of testing materials, and updated protocols for group gatherings. We want, if at all possible, to avoid a scenario where in-person worship leads to the virus infecting multiple members of congregation, subsequent community spread, and the need to once again suspend in-person worship and ministry activities. That exact scenario has occurred in churches in other parts of the country that re-opened too soon.

A recently updated document that became the center of discussion at the task force's initial meeting is a strategic plan offered by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). You may read this document at the following link: elca.org/publichealth. It is entitled "Resources for Returning to In-Person Worship." For those who do not have access to the web, you may call the church (336-6764) and

request a copy of the ELCA document be mailed to you.

This plan utilizes a three-phase approach for re-opening. The task force determined that current conditions meet the criteria for Phase One, but if conditions continue to improve, Phase Two activities may be possible in the near future. Phase One emphasizes a "virtual worship and education model." First Lutheran is blessed by a strong tradition of broadcasts and telecasts, as well as an outstanding media staff.

A multitude of factors make discussions and recommendations about re-opening complex. Please be assured that the work of the task force is approached with collective wisdom and a love for this church and its members. We will provide updates about the task force's recommendations and actions taken by the church council in response to the ever-changing conditions because of COVID-19.

God's grace to all of you as we continue to remain "in-place" for now. Please know in the full assurance of Jesus Christ that you are loved and missed, and we anxiously await the day when the doors of First Lutheran Church are once again wide open.

The Holy Trinity: Our Life in God

Some Fun Exercises for all Ages ~ for Holy Trinity Sunday, June 7

Introduction: Some seventeen centuries ago, so the story opens, the brilliant bishop and father of Western theology, St. Augustine (354-430 A.D.), was writing a book on the Trinity. The reason for this was his deep conviction that this doctrine—of the trinitarian nature of God—is at the heart of the Christian faith. One afternoon,

perhaps anticipating the dictum spoken years later by Friedrich Nietzsche, that ... 'the only true thoughts are those entertained outdoors' ... Augustine went for a stroll along the Mediterranean Sea. There, along the shoreline, he saw a young boy pouring seawater into a hole he'd dug in the sand. Augustine watched him for a while and then asked him what he was doing. "I'm

pouring the Mediterranean Sea into this hole," the boy replied. "Don't be so silly," smiled Augustine. "You can't fit the whole sea into that little hole. You're wasting your time." And without even looking up, the young lad responded, "And so are you ...trying to write a book that contains the mystery of God." (This is

one of those stories that, if it isn't true, certainly ought to be!) Augustine started working on this book entitled *De Trinitate* ("The Trinity") in the year 400 A.D. and even by 428 A.D, two years before his death, he confessed that it was still not finished. Perhaps the brilliant St. Augustine was also trying to pour the whole mystery of the Mediterranean (the nature of God) into a hole he'd dug in the sand (the sandy pages of a book)?

Martin Luther referred to John 3:16 (which is part of the Gospel Lesson assigned in Year B of the lectionary for Holy Trinity Sunday)—as the *euaggelion in nuce* ("gospel in a nutshell"). Please join in witnessing this well-beloved passage of Scripture with me: "For <u>God</u> so loved the world that he gave his only <u>Son</u>, that whoever <u>believes</u> in him will not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16; **RSV**). And so it is, that when we parse this passage, we gain a glimpse of the three-fold nature of God: reflected in the relational dynamic of **God the Father** ('Creator of heaven and earth'), **God the Son** ('who for us and our salvation came down from heaven'), and **God the Holy Spirit** ('the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son'). Not three gods (1+1+1) but one God in three personae (1 x 1 x 1).

In her book, *The Mind* of the Maker, Dorothy Sayers gives us some help here by thinking of a play, any play, such as Shakespeare's *Hamlet*. In very Augustinian fashion, she explains how the play was *first* in the mind of Shakespeare, *secondly*, he wrote it down on paper, and *thirdly*, the play is acted out on stage. Yet, all

three expressions are *Hamlet*. Do you have a cerebral hernia yet?! Still, having a simple but fundamental understanding of the Trinity is important —not only theologically, but for our everyday life of faith. It's not some abstraction for scholars to wrangle over; rather, the doctrine of the Trinity speaks of the



great creative and relational mystery of God and **Our Life in God.** And so it is that we, as Christian people, understand humanity to be "*created in God's image*" (Genesis 1:26-27; part of the OT lesson assigned for this year). We'll talk more about this trinitarian image in creation itself at the conclusion.

And so, come Trinity Sunday (on June 7), we are invited by God's Holy Spirit to pause and consider once more: "What does this mean?" And if we do, we'll see this trinitarian theme alive in our worship life each Sunday. Listen for it in the *Invocation*, in the *Prayers*, in the *Creeds*, and in the closing Benediction. So too does this nature and word of God come to us in our baptism and our death: claimed and committed "in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit." Now, the doctrine of the Trinity is not explicitly stated in the Bible. However, it is certainly implicit in the life of Jesus and his teachings through St. Paul—where Jesus points beyond himself to his "Father in heaven" and equally to his "Spirit, the Comforter" who gives life to all creation. (Cf. John 14:16-18, 23; John 15:26; I Corinthians 12:4-6; II Corinthians 13:13; Ephesians 4:4-6; and in the Gospel text assigned for this year, Matthew 28:19). Now something to be shared, especially with our children of First Lutheran. (Help me out here: parents/grands/aunts/uncles.)

"Hear, O Israel: The LORD our God is one LORD; and you shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might. And these words which I command you this day shall be upon your heart; and you shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house [or at the kitchen table], and when you [go for walks], and when you lie down [at bedtime], and when you rise (Deuteronomy 6:4-7; RSV.

Emphasis added.)

Taking a cue from Deuteronomy 6:4-9 that speaks of the importance of teaching our children in the faith, I would like to engage with you, and especially your children and grandchildren, in some family "conversation starters" regarding the nature of God, as illustrated by the doctrine of the Trinity. It is my prayer that this conversation will be instructive not only for our children, but for all of us as a congregation—as we seek a silver lining of "holy time" ... consecrating some of the "shuttering" and "stayingat-home" time ... to better listen and teach the story of God's love and salvation ... especially in the midst of the shadow of dark COVID-19 clouds that are raining disease and death upon God's creation. And ... like Augustine's experience, I'm willing to wager that these young people will teach us something too! So to begin, a deeper understanding of the Holy Trinity in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

I. God the Father. Read the opening verses of the Bible aloud, from Genesis 1:1-5: "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth ... "And then read Psalm 24:1 and Psalm 46. Now, if I were to ask you what God is like, what would you say? How would you picture God? (Have your children draw a picture of God. What does it "say" to you when you interpret it together? Does God have muscles? Male or female? Long white beard? Kinda like Dumbledore in *Harry Potter*? Are there clouds underneath or overhead?) So then, what one word perhaps describes God to you from the OT passages of Genesis 1 and Psalm 24 and 46? Yes, God is the Creator of all things visible and invisible. And how do you see God related to creation? (Read here from Isa. 43:24: Acts 17:28; Romans 8:22). So, God is not simply 'out there' beyond some distant star, but very near to us ... continuing to nourish and sustain his creation. St. Augustine once wrote: "God is closer to us than we are to ourselves." (Read I Corinthians 3:16.) If you know it, sing the hymn: "What a friend we have in Jesus."

II. God the Son. So ... how do we know that God the

creator loves us or cares for us? How do we know what God is <u>like</u>? (There's a big difference between saying that God exists and what God is like. You can't read this off a majestic mountainside or hear it in a babbling brook.) Read now from the Gospel of John 1:18: "No one has seen God; but his only Son, who is in the bosom of the Father, he has made him known." Does this give us a hint? Right! Jesus reveals the heart of God for us. (Read also out loud from John 10:30; Colossians 1:15-20; and close with Matthew 6:9-13). Note how Jesus even refers to God the Creator as "Father." We might even say that Jesus puts a face to God. Recall stories from Sunday School and also Vacation Bible School ... what stories do you find the most exciting? Where Jesus shows God's love to people: befriending especially those who felt ill or lost or didn't have any friends? What is perhaps one word here that we could use to describe Jesus' relationship to us? (Companion) If you only know the 1st verse of the well-beloved hymn, sing: "What a Friend We Have in Jesus."

III. God the Holy Spirit. Now for a kind of tough one ... How is Jesus still present with us today? Listen carefully as you again read aloud these words from the Gospel of John 14:15-20. Does this give you any hints? Right! The Holy Spirit continues to breathe new life into us through the sacraments of Baptism and Holy Communion. What is perhaps the one word we could use to describe the Holy Spirit? (Comforter) The Early Church Fathers, which included St. Augustine, referred to the Church "as Jesus' ongoing body in the world" (cf. John 20:22; Acts 2; I Cor. 6: 19-20; 12:1; II Cor. 4:7). Write the word CHURCH

of paper and then ask your children: "Who is the church?"

They might refer to a building or an address like 327 South Dakota Avenue. But then have them underline the two middle letters of the word, CHURCH and ask them again: "Who is the church?" Yes! UR. YOU ARE! Together, each one of us is a beloved child of God, called and gathered by the Holy Spirit in Jesus' name and claimed by his Word through the waters of baptism, and then we are called to proclaim this Word of God's love and forgiveness as Christ's ongoing body, his Church, for all the world. Read now in closing the Gospel text that we will hear, come Holy Trinity Sunday on June 7, from Matthew 28:16-20.

Remember we said at the beginning that we were going to consider how it is that we can see or experience some amazing trinitarian expressions of our life in God each day. Here are a few: 1) How many primary colors are there? [3 ~ Blue/Yellow/Red]; 2) How do we measure human pregnancy from conception? [Trimesters]; and 3) What is the strongest geometric or architectural figure? [A triangle]. Such is the wonder of God's Trinitarian reflections in life.

"The Trinity is the Church's way of saying that God is so intimately, inwardly and steadfastly bound up with the whole of reality, both past and future, that nothing can separate us from God. It is this relatedness which is certain, for all eternity, and that is the basis of our hope."

FIRST LUTHERAN CHURCH WOMEN

Details become so important. This First Lutheran Church has always found reason to celebrate them and even bring them about. At it's inception women could not vote. But we all know they made coffee, served food, sang hymns, and, above all, prayed to the God they loved

and trusted. In part, because of them, the church still stands, STANDS STRONG.

One of our ladies was president of FLCW 50 years ago. I asked Janet Naessig to relay some of her memories from that time. My, how things have changed, while some traditions are still being carried on. The following are some glimpses of her memories.

- 1. In 1970, First Lutheran Church Women had 493 active members participating in 17 circles. All married women and widows were listed by their husbands' names.
- 2. A representative of FLCW did not sit on the church council or attend its meetings. Dorothy Grey Instead, the president was required to report monthly to a one-man Board of Organizational Coordination. As a leader of meetings in the Parish Hall Parlor, she was expected to keep the piano dusted and to switch the curtain panels on the south wall to maintain even exposure to the sun. By 1975 the FLCW president could attend church council meetings, but she did not yet have a vote.
- 3. Officers and program committees at that time were similar to those of the present day. However, the president was expected to attend a meeting of every circle at least once a year. Circle members regularly visited shut-ins and patients in Sioux Valley Hospital, McKennan Hospital and Yankton State Hospital.
- 4. The women were responsible for keeping the kitchens well supplied and for serving all events including decorating, food preparation, washing dishes and cleanup. There was one notable exception, the Mother-Daughter Banquet each May. Tickets sold in advance brought large crowds accommodated on long tables placed end to end in Fellowship Hall. Although the women did the preparation, aproned men did the actual serving.
- 5. Then, as now, engaged quilting ladies arrived at the church early one morning to deliver their wares to the Union Gospel Mission (yes, they still support them also). In one of the rooms off the Service Center, they found quilts that were being used as bedding on a table. Since food had been missing from the Fellowship Hall kitchen, a search was instigated. A young man who was AWOL from the U.S. Navy was found hiding in the storage hall above the kitchen serving area. (Leave it to the women to solve a mystery.)

Glimpses in Time

- 6. Many stewardship projects done then continue now with much being done at home. The slogan one year was "Never come to circle empty handed."
- 7. For the bazaar, each circle had a wooden booth on the lower level of the Parish Hall. The food was prepared and served in Fellowship Hall. The lefse was made at

the church with the use of a large floor model mixer and gas grills connected in rows for the baking. With no false ceiling, the exposed overhead pipes were used as arrangement guidelines and curtain hangers to create separations. Baked goods were cut, buttered and arranged in the closets. Special permission had to be obtained to move the portrait of Rev. H.J. Glenn so it didn't get splattered with coffee. One year the Friday bazaar was delayed by a blizzard. Because of more available help on Saturday, it was permanently moved to Saturday.

8. The "good" china was used only for special occasions like wedding receptions. It had to be hand washed and was kept in a locked cupboard. An employed kitchen assistant kept the silver service polished, but circle members reported hours early to "baby sit" the wedding cake, guide the wedding party and keep the punch from being spiked. Today, an employee assists with laundry and upkeep.

We thank Janet and many others for their years of devoted service. As activities reconvene during this year of 100th Anniversary events, Jane King and Arlene Bich will help us to hear from and about the experiences of many others.


Staff Updates

Marilyn is retiring July 31 after nearly 18 years on First Lutheran's staff.




Mandie has an extensive background

Thank you, FLC, for a part of your story.




Thank You First Lutheran Volunteers

Last year during the five days at First Lutheran, the Dental

Service is provided at no cost to the child or family and is open to the public. No insurance is necessary. Advance registration is required. Please help us get the word out about this upcoming opportunity.

The COVID-19 crisis has taught my family to appreciate our health and freedoms. We have been forced to spend much more time together, and we have





In Jeremiah 28:11 we hear: "For I know the plans I have for you" declares the Lord "plans to prosper you and not harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

So, needless to say, I did what I've always done in tough situations. I went to work and worked very hard. I also made it a point to wake up every day with the attitude that things will work out. I truly do believe that with a positive attitude and a belief that there is a plan for me, everything will be okay.

Long story short—things slowly began to turn around. It just took patience. We were able to avoid bankruptcy and best of all, I was able to pay my mother back. That was a heavy burden lifted.

Life, as in business, has its challenges for us all. This current COVID-19 situation is bleak and depressing, but it will pass. Remember, we are all here for a reason. There is a plan for us. We just have to be patient. Joshua 1:9 says "Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the Lord God is with you wherever you go."

Let us pray. Lord God, thank you for giving us this time together to be with, uplift, and reassure each other as we all try to navigate these uncertain times. Help us as we try to remember that you are always guiding us though at times we may question the direction. Thank you for your steadfast love and understanding. Ministry Partner Update: St. Francis House



The St. Francis House (SFH) operates as a transitional home located just east of downtown Sioux Falls, South Dakota. People of all races, genders, and creeds are welcomed at the St. Francis House. The SFH operates

with the guiding mission of "Moving People From Homelessness to Hope" by offering a "hand up," not a "hand out."

Through the collaborative effort of the late Bishop Paul Dudley and Pastor David Holm, on March 15, 1987, the doors were opened utilizing the former Little Flower Catholic Convent located on the corner of Austin Street and Sherman Avenue. In those early days, First Lutheran Church provided the financial resources for daily operations. The Little Flower Convent building was originally built to house 12 nuns, but recently was used to house up to 72 individuals.



On May 11, 2018, the St. Francis House kicked off the "Homelessness to Hope Capital Campaign" to not only build a new home for guests, but to expand to serve more individuals. On May 4, 2019, a groundbreaking ceremony was held, and work began to build a new home for those seeking a "hand up" rather than a "hand out" in life. Phase I construction would build about two-thirds of the new facility and would include one wing of guest rooms, new offices, the dining room, and a state-of-the-art commercial kitchen with expanded refrigerator and freezer storage

On Friday, December 20, 2019, guests moved out of the old building, the first meal was served, and guests slept their first night in their new home. The current capacity of the house is serving 46 female and 34 male guests. Phase II of this project is projected to be completed during the summer of 2020 providing additional beds for individuals in our community.

Today the new St. Francis House stands strong. Once Phase II is completed this summer, SFH will serve 120 single individuals, with 60 beds for females and 60 beds for males. In addition, SFH has the ability to serve families with children within two quad apartment-style buildings providing seven family units.

Besides providing housing for those in need, SFH also provides three meals each day as well as case management services to assist guests. Guests are required to obtain and maintain employment. Guests must attend treatment classes and counseling if they have struggled with addiction. There is emphasis in helping to rebuild their relationships with family. Guests are required to deposit all income and make arrangements to pay off their debts, including any fines, restitution, child support, and past due utilities. Guests of the SFH have paid off millions of dollars in restitution, fines and child support in the history of the organization.

The St. Francis House remains a strong ministry partner with First Lutheran Church. Along with many other churches, service organizations, businesses, and committed volunteers, the St. Francis House is a strong and vibrant ministry in our community. In the First Lutheran Church Capital Campaign, the St. Francis House has been designated as a benefactor of support from the Mission Support component. Please keep the work of the St. Francis House in your prayers, and be mindful of this great organization that keeps moving people from Homelessness to Hope.

Church on the Street



Church on the Street (COTS) is a partnership ministry of the South Dakota Synod, which began in 2015 and walks alongside those living in poverty and homelessness. The congregation is comprised of great diversity socio-economically and culturally. Some COTS members

may be living on the streets while others are in shelters, abandoned cars, or couch surfing. Over the past several years, many individuals have become housed and return to worship and gather as a church community. People are encouraged to lead, and many have become leaders in the church. Worship and street ministry provide opportunities for leaders to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ while nurturing the faith of the entire congregation.

Rebel Hurd serves as the Mission Developer for COTS. Rebel is a candidate for Word and Sacrament ministry in the South Dakota Synod and has recently completed her coursework for her Master of Divinity degree from Luther Seminary. She is currently on internship at St. John American Lutheran Church in Sioux Falls until this fall. The COTS office and storage is housed at First Lutheran Church with many FLC members actively participating in the work of the ministry.

Laundry with Love blossomed out of the genuine relationships formed on the street. When the need for clean laundry was identified, it became a ministry of COTS. Harriet Monson, coordinator of Laundry with Love, keeps busy planning laundry days and handling donations. Due to the financial crisis as of late, the need for this ministry has grown by leaps and bounds.

Church on the Street also offers four special events each year. The Holistic Health and Healing event held at First Lutheran Church in February had hundreds in attendance. In July, an Arts in the Park day is held for families to find healthy alternative activities through art. In the fall an Empty Bowl fundraiser is held at Our Savior's Lutheran. The Augustana University's Chapel Team has organized a 5K run/walk to support COTS properly named the Guide Your Feet 5k. First Lutheran African Ministry
