# Listening Carefully for [God's] Word in Lean Times

"Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the LORD under [the mentorship of the priest] Eli. And the word of the LORD was rare in those days; there was no frequent vision." (I Samuel 3:1; RSV. Emphasis added.)

Listening carefully for God's Word in lean times. This message is really at the heart of the

well-beloved Old Testament story of a young lad named Samuel, who would later become the first—in a long line of prophets—in Israel. And ... it's also a message that's imperative for the hearing of many a congregation in our time, as much of the divisive toxin in our culture and politics (think Washington, D.C. these days) is seeping into the church—as pastors and parishioners are increasingly 'exchanging their religion for socio-political and personal agendas' (cf. Robert D. Putnam's *American Grace*). As you see by the title of this article, the question is: "Are we listening to an emphasis on God's Word, centered in Christ and Holy Scripture, or is God's Word *bracketed-out* by our delusions of grandeur and thinking *our* words, *our* thoughts, *our* agendas, *our* politics are to be emphasized?" As Jesus would remind us: "A divided house will not stand" (Mark 3:25; cf. Putnam's *American Grace* p.493f).

In Samuel's day, lean times did not only refer to economic depression (though folk were dirt poor), or the threat of war (though wars were going on all around them). But there was a deeper, spiritual leanness: "that the word of the LORD was rare in those days" (cf. Amos 8:11-12). In large part, the reason for this spiritual leanness was because the people of Israel had fallen prey to the temptation that's with us in our own time ... to state it one more time for emphasis: politics had become their religion (cf. Martin Marty's Politics, Religion, and the Common Good or Os Guinness' *The Case For Civility*). They wanted a king, like all of their neighboring nations, who would be a visible symbol of prominence. They got what they wanted. And sadly, Israel and her new kings began to grow deaf and dumb to the one true King who'd given them life and all creation (cf. I Samuel 8:4-9; 10:19). They lost their center (Exodus 20:1-6). To paraphrase Tom Simmons' epilogue at our Annual Meeting on Sunday, January 26: 'Let's not lose our sense of purpose, our mission, as to why we're

here—as a congregation of First Lutheran Church' (cf. Genesis 12:1-3; Matthew 28:18-20; Ephesians 3:10).

Lean times. Curious how two-faced our media is these days. I can watch TV for 30 minutes and hear both a death-toll ringing on the economy and then see a glitzy commercial for buying a six-figure car. We cringe at the crime rates escalating in Sioux Falls and denounce the wars in the Middle East. But mayhem on the gridiron is how 70 million Americans spent Super Bowl Sunday last month (including the Minnesota Vikings for yet another 50 years). We have such low energies (with the exception of some wonderful new mission starts growing out of, or connected with, our Evangelism and Outreach and Pastoral Care ministries such as "Church on the Street" or "Kin Ministry" through First Lutheran) for helping the mentally ill, the hungry and homeless, the imprisoned or unemployed, or the refugee or aged of society. Too often we simply want to throw up our hands in frustration and just forget about "all this tough stuff" in our entertainment culture. YET this is exactly when the church—that's us—needs to have our priorities and our guiding center in place, with high definition. When "the Word of the LORD was rare [and lean] in those days; there was no frequent vision."

Written in the aftermath of WWI, the Irish poet, Wm. Butler Yeats, spoke prophetically of our 20th century spiritual malaise in these words from his poem, "The Second Coming." They bear repeating. Listen ...

"Turning and turning in the widening gyre
The falcon cannot hear the falconer;
Things fall apart; the center cannot hold;
Mere anarchy is loosed upon the world,
The blood-dimmed tide is loosed, and everywhere
The ceremony of innocence is drowned;
The best lack all conviction, while the worst
are full of passionate intensity."

When we can no longer hear the Word of God, we fly aimlessly with Yeats' falcon. With all of our technology, which can be such a blessing in so many ways, it can also become distracting (see MIT professor, Sherry Turkle's recent critique in *Alone Together*). We struggle for direction because the homing center of God's Word can so easily become lost by us. We've become terrible listeners

# The Uncomfortable Church

Last month I read a two-page article entitled "5 Lies We Like to Tell About Church Growth" by Dan Hotchkiss, a church consultant. At the heart of each of his "5 Lies" was the uncomfortable truth that congregations prefer their comfort above everything else, including the mission of Christ's church, and therefore perpetuate a number of false narratives that

protect comfort at all cost. For example, "Growth isn't about numbers" is used to protect us from the hard work of making ministry available to more people. After all, if it is important for 15 people, why wouldn't we want 25 people to take part? Maybe because we prioritize personal comfort at the expense of the uncomfortable changes required when more people are included.

It's a good question to wrestle with because it gets to the heart of the nature of church. The church is created by and lives on God's Word. This Word is a comfort because it reassures us of God's promise, but that is not comforting in the way we would choose. It's comfort that in the midst of changing, turbulent, and challenging situations, God's love and mercy and grace are gifts to us to give to all whom we find in need.

So, one of Dan Hotchkiss' conclusions is striking. "No one who understands what growth involves would 'want' it, in the sense that we 'want' pleasure or consumer goods. The only reason a sane person would want a church to grow is because they believe it has something of importance to offer other people. For that goal, some people will accept the hard work, sacrifice, and inconvenience growth requires."

#### **Community Building**

In discussions over the past four months, the First Lutheran Church Council has identified a ministry focus area for the coming year: Community Building. We have noticed that First Lutheran has a strong history of offering great programming. Furthermore, last year the council decided to ask boards to work together to pool our outreach efforts in order to offer six community events. So far we have had three such events (Block Party, Trunk-or-Treat, Christmas Eve), each receiving over 1,000 guests. We seem to be pretty good at outreach and inviting new people, and by the grace of God, they have shown up here. So there is great hope that by enhancing our community building (welcoming, hospitality, personal connections), all our ministries would benefit from deeper connections between people and various groups across First Lutheran Church.

Improving our "Community Building" means making helpful changes to our ministries to remove barriers of participation and allow us to include more people in the hope and joy we receive from God through First Lutheran Church. This includes inviting and making space for new people (current members or new faces), listening to people's needs, then helping them get into the right ministries for them (training, follow up with guests, new and current members), and providing care and comfort (hospitality, friendship, fellowship, prayer, the joy of knowing Christ).

It means getting used to getting beyond our personal comfort zones, being uncomfortable and taking the risk of building new relationships, in order to offer comfort to someone else.

# **Ministry Plan 2020**

Over the next four months, the council and boards of First Lutheran will suggest changes to all of our ministries to improve how this happens throughout the congregation. As a starter, the Welcome & Community Board has been visiting with all the other boards to start a conversation on hospitality, gather ideas on being more welcoming, and begin the process of asking what each board can do better in building community. Watch for updates about this process.

But that's just the start. And even though it may be uncomfortable, building up this community with God's Word is not just the job of pastors, staff, boards, and council. It is who we are as the church of Jesus Christ, who gives us his promise and sends it with us to our family, friends, neighbors, and the world. For as Jesus promises, "I am with you even to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20). That is both our greatest comfort and the promise that carries us beyond our comfort zone.

# "Let Everything That Hath Breath, Praise the Lord!" MUSIC MINISTRY **Anniversary Concert Premieres New Music**

Throughout 2020, First Lutheran Church celebrates 100 years of ministry as a congregation. In addition to inviting former pastors and musicians to lead us in worship, the worship and music board has worked


diligently over the past two years to present a Centennial Concert on September 13, 2020. The concert is this year's Lankford Arts Series event and provides the first opportunity for us to gather as a congregation in celebration. Please plan to join us for a unique afternoon of music.

#### Musicians

In celebration of 100 years of ministry, familiar faces to First Lutheran, including musicians from South Dakota and around the country, will join us for the concert. These include:

- Grammy-award winning organist Paul Jacobs of The Juilliard School, who rededicated the Aeolian-Skinner sanctuary pipe organ in February of 2011.
- Maestro David Gier and members of the South Dakota Symphony Orchestra.
- *Transept*, a South Dakota area vocal ensemble and Artistic Director Dr. Timothy Campbell, who also serves as Assistant Professor of Music at The University of South Dakota.
- First Lutheran Church Choirs, who will premiere new music for organ, orchestra, and choir

alongside these guest musicians.



For years, new music has marked significant milestones in the life of congregations and communities. Handel's Water Music and a number of Johann Sebastian Bach's sacred and secular cantatas were written for such celebrations.

To honor this anniversary, First Lutheran Church commissioned composer Wayne Oquin of The Juilliard School to write a new piece of music, "Reflections on Two Psalms: Psalm 23 and



Psalm 150," for organ, orchestra, and choir. Both Psalms are likely familiar, with Psalm 23 beginning "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want..." and Psalm 150 calling for "everything that has breath" to "praise the Lord!"

Commissioning new choral music around congregational anniversaries is common; the addition of writing for organ and orchestra made locating a suitable composer especially challenging and unique. Having collaborated with organist

Paul Jacobs on past projects with symphony orchestras around the country, composer Wayne Oquin has written a wonderful piece of music. Accompanied by strings, harp, woodwind quintet, percussion, and organ, it is our hope this music will be premiered in 2020 and later shared with the wider Church across the country.

This new music also provides a unique opportunity for you to join in singing. If you enjoy music, you are invited to community-wide rehearsals to learn, rehearse, and prepare this new piece. Consider joining us for this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. See below for more details.

In addition to a fabulous new piece, organist Paul Jacobs will provide solo organ music. As the only organist to win a Grammy award in 2011, Jacobs tours extensively throughout the United States and around the world each year and frequently collaborates with symphony orchestras alongside solo concerts. This marks his second time at First Lutheran Church, as he previously dedicated the restored Aeolian-Skinner sanctuary organ in 2011.

Known for presenting concerts entirely from memory, Paul Jacobs made musical history when he performed the complete organ works of Johann Sebastian Bach on the 250th anniversary of the composer's death. The pipe organ is often called the "King of Instruments" in music circles; Paul Jacobs has the distinction of being named the "King of the King of Instruments." His work and musicianship is generational and not to be missed.

Alongside Paul's work, a relatively new South Dakota vocal ensemble, *Transept*, will offer a cappella choral music. Directed by University of South Dakota Associate Professor Timothy Campbell, they are a vocal ensemble of elite professional singers and select local musicians based in Sioux Falls and are already recognized throughout this community and state for their exquisite work.

# **WELCA Hosts Harmony South Dakota-March 5**

Dan and Heidi Goeller have put together an amazing thing! When Hazel Wek, our FLCW accompanist, attended a performance of Harmony South Dakota, she was so impressed that she said this was a must for the WELCA program schedule. Please join us on March 5 at 12 p.m. in the Gathering Room, for our monthly WELCA meeting. Hear the Goellers present an explanatory card trick with slides and performance video of Harmony South Dakota.

This organization was incorporated on July 25, 2013. Harmony's methodology is based on El Sistema, a program in its 45th year in Venezuela, currently serving over 980,000 of that country's poorest children. El Sistema has demonstrated the power of ensemble music to dramatically change the life trajectory of a nation's youth while transforming the communities around them. Harmony's cofounder, Dan Goeller, witnessed the effectiveness of Mexico's Sistema program in April 2013 while conducting concerts there. He became determined to bring the transformational power of this program to Sioux Falls. Thus, on January 2, 2014, Harmony began its pilot program with 21 students from Hawthorne Elementary School. It has now grown to 78 students from 12 different Sioux Falls schools for the 2019-20 school

Harmony South Dakota, under their leadership, empowers underprivileged children. This free







afterschool program gives children, age seven and up, the opportunity to transform their lives through immersive music education and performance. The Goellers will share about their teaching of positive life skills leading to healthy and compassionate young citizens through music.

Lois Circle will host this noon luncheon. Before the event, the WELCA board meeting will be in the Friendship Room at 10 a.m. All First Lutheran Church women, their friends, and guests are welcome to come hear Dan and Heidi share the story of this learning experience now available locally.





# **Care and Health Board Survey**





#### January 16, 2020

- •Randy Eide, Treasurer, reported that we had very good fourth quarter, and we ended with \$9,889 of income over expenses. This was due to the generosity of the congregation after a letter was sent to the encouraging members to give. FLC received 101% of the pledges.
- Deb Nelson of the Welcome &
   Community was thanked for visiting
   the boards discussing hospitality and
   what that means for each board.
- Pastor John gave a brief capital campaign update. Visits are ongoing during the lead phase of the campaign. The cash that has been received has been applied to the HVAC debt. Jim Sturdevant has graciously decided to paint two paintings to be auctioned off with the proceeds going to our capital campaign.
- Pastor Jeff reported that he and his board are continuing to find ways to work in the community. He shared the St. Francis House's new facility hosted its first meal. Necessities for Neighbors is going well, and many families are being helped. Over Christmas break, FLC partnered with some neighbors and served approximately 350 meals to families of Lowell Elementary.
- Pastor Lars thanked the boards, staff, and congregation for all their help in December. Community building is ongoing. He shared a draft of the 2020 Ministry Plan focusing on building community. Community building means making helpful

- changes to our ministries to remove barriers of participation and to allow us to include more people in the hope and joy we receive from God through First Lutheran Church.
- •There was an update regarding the sound system and ceiling in the sanctuary. James Moore summarized a report from the acoustician working with FLC. Gypsum board will work with just a small increase of reverberation (from 1.52 to 2.36 seconds). The entire ceiling does not have to be replaced with gypsum board. (cf. Dr. M. Scott Peck's The Road Once *Traveled*, p.121f). Interrupting and interrupted. In a recent issue of the Wall Street Journal, a University of Wisconsin professor of communications (!) is quoted rather humorously: "At our house we warn new friends to be careful because we treat conversation as a competitive sport! The first person to take a breath is considered to be the listener." However, it's not so humorous when it comes to matters of the spirit. Where do we hear God's Word for us in the "lean times" of our own 21st century? When "the Word of the LORD is rare [and lean] in these days."

If you read a bit further to v.3 from the opening passage of this article (i.e. I Samuel 3:3), you'll hear these words: "The lamp of God has not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying where the ark of God was." There it is! There it is! In times when God appears to have withdrawn and grown silent in the face of his people's interruptions and idolatry, Samuel was still close to the Ark. The point? Stay within the range of that source of our spiritual life and guidance even though the source may seem silent at times; that is, God's Word (cf. Habakkuk 2:3; also, Barbara Brown Taylor's When God Is Silent). God does indeed speak to his world and to his people even when times are lean. And such times can become most defining ... As Christians we claim this truth because Jesus Christ has come into our world as God's Word incarnate (John 1:14)—identifying with us in all of our sufferings even onto the leanness of a cross. In Jesus, the silence of God finds voice, a voice that says, "You're precious to me. You're not alone. I'm with you. I'll never let you go" (Psalm 23:4; Matthew 28:19-20; John 10:28-30). Why is this so important? Because our American culture today is shot through with fear. And fearful people have a hard time listening because when we're afraid, all we can hear is ourselves, our own pounding heartbeat. And the more afraid we are, the harder listening becomes.

#### Family and friends of First Lutheran

Church: like Samuel, stay close to the Ark of God's Word when fear would try to flood your ears or heart. Stay close to God's Word in regular worship. Become involved in one of our many Bible studies or small group ministries. Participate in one of our many mission outreach ministries. Surround yourself in the upcoming Lenten study, with special thanks to Pastor Katherine's creativity (entitled "Witnesses" with its various worksheets for small group study and podcasts each week) with some of our family members in the faith, here at First Lutheran and beyond. Stay tuned in. "Be still," says the LORD, "listen, and know that I am God [who is always with you and for you]" (Psalm 46:10). And the word of the LORD was not rare or lean, but ... FAT in these days!

Let us pray..."Lord, open our ears to hear anew the word of your prophets: "[To] say to those who are of a fearful heart. 'Be strong, fear not! Behold our God will come and save us. For then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ear of the deaf unstopped." (Isaiah 35:4-5)

# **Covering the Light of Christ with a Basket**

I have recently been in conversation with a group of pastors, deacons, and lay leaders from all around the South Dakota Synod, as well as some leadership from other synods as we have been conversing about how to lift up leadership in our churches.

This conversation began last fall as I was contacted again and again about how it is

that First Lutheran has had, and currently has, so many people engaged in the seminary process. Now, I will admit that I do not know the silver bullet answer to this question but trust that the Holy Spirit continues to call people through the gospel, and through you as well, to encourage people to discern a vocation in ministry. I know for me it was a few people in this congregation who planted the thought and encouraged my own discernment though I did not begin taking classes to become a pastor. I merely had a curiosity about the doctrine of faith that we call the Lutheran tradition and what it meant to be Lutheran. Be careful what God may be calling you into...you too might be a pastor! But for certain, you are now a minister.

Our conversations have led to the development of a new initiative that First Lutheran will host this year on June 4 where the 209 congregations from around our synod will be asked to send one person from their congregation who exhibits gifts and qualities for being a leader in the church. This conference is called Confluence Leadership Summit 2020. The idea is to bring in keynote speakers to facilitate a conversation centering on vocational discernment and encouraging leadership. This is not just an opportunity to help identify and accompany those who might be discerning a call to professional ministry but is even more so for people who are or can be effective leaders in their own congregations. This can be recently elected church council members, ministry volunteers, church camp staff, even everyday pew sitters. The conference will host breakout sessions to tackle more detailed subjects like what is involved in the candidacy process, church council membership, or how to make a functional ministry budget.

The whole of this initiative is about moving people and congregations from maintenance ministry mentality to exploring ways in which God calls individuals and whole congregations back into mission in the world. What we have recognized is that many congregations have adopted a mindset that limits their function to only worship services and coffee afterwards because they are convinced that they do not have something unique for the world to hear. What fuels this is fear, and it presents itself in several ways.

The most common is simply the fear of change, and I would assert that this is commonly heard in our midst. Here at First Lutheran we have our routines and traditions that we have clung to for a long time. I often hear, I remember when \_\_\_\_\_\_ (fill in the blank), and it is often followed by the comment, "We need to do that again." The risk of inviting new people into our

midst is that they might bring about some new ideas and an element of change. If you want an example, bring up video screens in the sanctuary. There are two camps on this discussion, and both sides are represented in this discussion. I dare say, this is also the passionate discussion around some parts of the current capital campaign. However, without sounding cliché in today's world, if you build it, they may still not come. This is because being the church is about people and relationships. The real fear is that we do not have something to say or do not know how to say it. This is the devil working in our midst to shut us up. Each of you is a minister of the Church, Christ's church. Each of you has been called through the gospel, gathered and enlightened by the work of the Spirit, and are sanctified in true faith; then you are sent back out into the world to share His good news.

But if you come here and gather for worship and you receive God's Word of truth and then go back out into your lives, into the world, and do not live and speak that gospel truth in the world—the devil wins. Even more so, if you come to this place and only stick to your routines and only talk to the same people each time you come and do not take the opportunity to look around you to greet the guests who are in your midst, or make space and invite people into the things you love here, the devil wins. There are new people and families who come here regularly who are never engaged because we are fearful of what to say or do.

This is a dangerous statement, but we have to be better. This is the work of EACH person who gathers in this place to reach out to others, to invite others, to welcome others, to encourage each other in faith. This is not "somebody else's job." This is about the kingdom of God coming near for all people who the Holy Spirit calls into our midst. It is what we are called to do as Christians, and when we do not do it, the devil wins.

Friends and family of First Lutheran Church, each of you was given a unique voice to be a leader in the Church, Christ's church. And that is to invite, welcome, and share the gospel of Jesus Christ with guests who visit and with people in your life. This is not just the job of the pastors and staff. It is not enough to come to worship, only to go back out into the world and not think about what the gospel calls you to do or say. You have been given a unique voice in the world, and that is a voice of truth and hope. God's Word and his Son is the voice of light in a dark world. Do not put a basket over this light by fear. If you do, the devil wins.
