Pentecost: Filled with New Wine

"But God raised him up, having freed him from death, because it was impossible for him to be held in its power." - Acts 2:24

In the Bible accounts of the days following Jesus' resurrection, there are 50 days between Easter and Pentecost. In those inbetween weeks, Jesus appeared

many times to various people so that even though the news was too strange to believe, people just couldn't help themselves. Too many people, too many stories, too many eyewitness accounts meant that even though his resurrection was irrational and unreasonable, nevertheless it was true. Jesus was alive beyond death, and he was coming to his people to give them hope in his new life.

Yet still, on the day of Pentecost, after appearing to the disciples and others for 50 days, there weren't a whole lot of Christian believers. Many in Jerusalem still doubted the resurrection news and convinced themselves that the disciples who had seen Jesus either made up the stories to cover up their grief or to keep their revolution going. The beginning of Acts even tells us that the disciples asked Jesus if "this is the time when you are going to restore the kingdom to Israel?" It's an understandable question when you believe that Jesus was going to start a revolution.

Pentecost, however, is not a revolution, movement, or any kind of social reform that we might hope for. Instead, Pentecost is the giving of the Holy Spirit who empowers the disciples and the believers gathered together to go into the world to preach, to proclaim the good news of Jesus' death and resurrection. There aren't any other goals, principles to follow, or measurable outcomes. Just go and preach to every nation, in any language, to any ears that will hear the good news.

This is so far from our normal way of living. We always have goals. We need measured outcomes to know if we are making a difference in the world. How else can we be sure we are doing God's work in the world? So maybe you can get an idea of how strange Pentecost and the good news of Jesus' resurrection are in a dying world. Maybe that's why they were accused of being drunk and filled with new wine!

New wine is exactly the point. You cannot put new wine in old wine skins, for they will burst. Pentecost is the pouring out of new wine through the Holy Spirit so that the old world becomes flooded with the immeasurable goodness of Christ beyond our rational comprehensions and the goals we set for ourselves. It is the Spirit giving tongues to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ for the entire world to hear!

New Podcast Series, May 3-24

Three Classic Interpretations of the Atonement: In Light of St. Matthew's Gospel"

"Why Jesus Died: Interpreting the Atonement"

"It is the greatness and heart of the Christian message that God, as manifest in the Christ of the Cross, totally participates in the dying of a child, in the condemnation of the criminal, in the disintegration of the mind, in starvation and famine, and even in the human rejection of Himself. There is no human condition into which the divine presence does not penetrate. This is what the Cross, the most extreme of all human conditions, tells us." (Paul Tillich; **The Eternal Now**, p.46)

The Introduction of this series will be followed by three podcasts on three classic interpretations of the atoning work of Christ upon the cross. The series will further conversation based on USD Law School Professor Emeritus Jon Van Patten's excellent podcast forum on April 4, "The Trial of Jesus: from An Attorney's Perspective." Van Patten's podcast can be found at flcsf.org/podcasts under the Educational Forums button. From May 3 through May 24 you can listen to podcasts posted on our FLC website as well as download various worksheets. The reason for this "furthered conversation" is quite timely, as we reflect back upon the Season of Lent and forward into the Season of Easter. But also, because the verdict that was shared by the attorneys and former judges who were part of the forum, as well as the opinion of "the jury" of other participants, was of a strong and unanimous consensus: "Jesus was innocent of any of the charges that were brought before Herod and Pilate. So why did he 'have to' die? What in the world was Jesus doing on a cross for heaven's sake?!"

Marathon/Century Ride Challenge

The Caring and Health ministry team is acutely aware of the benefits of exercise during this unusual period of isolation and stress dealing with COVID-19.



We are challenging all FLC members and friends, young or old, to walk or run a marathon of 26 miles or bike a century ride (100 miles) over 21 days, May 7-27. This is a great way for families to engage in a physical exercise project together with some possible competition or singles to participate in a personal wellness program. All who complete the challenge will have their names entered in a drawing for Scheel's gift cards and be included in a Marathon/Century Ride Honor Roll in a summer First Word and be invited to a celebration in the fall.

- All participants must register with John Hegg, johnhegg@sio.midco.net with name(s) and email address of each participant by May 7. John should be notified when the challenge has been completed, on or before May 27.
- Any exercise equipment that records miles or steps is acceptable.
- For conformity, 2,250 steps will be

equal to one mile. Kids 5th grade and under use 2,000 steps per mile.

- Those without a pedometer, Fitbit, or similar device, mark out a quarter-, half-, or one-mile route by the car odometer. Or, count steps manually.
- There are half- and one-mile markers on the bike path.
- Families and groups can get creative competing with/encouraging each other, e.g. the first in the group to complete the challenge earns something.

What a great challenge for families and people of all ages to engage in an exercise program! And what a special way to incorporate devotions before, after, or during each daily exercise event.


FIRST LUTHERAN CHURCH WOMEN A Product of Faith

With cookbooks, baked goods, and apron sales, they helped to create and build our beautiful First Lutheran Church in Sioux Falls. Over the years, the women worked to assist in establishing area churches; service agencies; educational institutions; and local, national, and global missions. At the same time, the First Lutheran Church Women continued to provide and enjoy the fellowship of their Christian growth and service together. Over the years of serving various church functions, especially funerals, their annual bazaar became a major church wide event that continues to result in great support of missions locally, nationally, and globally. Our nation was recently invaded by the unknown in the form of the COVID-19 pandemic. At the time of this writing, most of us are sheltered in place and unable to meet because of community constraints for personal safety. First Lutheran Church has followed the prescribed guidelines. Hello? Is anyone out there?

As we continue to isolate ourselves from one another during these times of physical distancing, I have heard more and more people talk about the oppression of isolation. Each day, I have been blessed to have conversations with many people, where there is almost exuberance in talking with someone.

The week before Palm Sunday, several volunteers and I helped the Youth & Family staff distribute Palm Sunday activity packets to 113 families. I personally had nine packets to deliver, and I found that when I knocked or rang the doorbell, every door was opened, and a good conversation ensued. I was telling the other pastors that even kids that hardly even grunt at you most of the time were excited to talk and share what they had been up to.

To be honest, the last couple of weeks have been a real struggle in that though we have had a long history of broadcasting our services, it is quite different to hold worship when there is no one sitting in the sanctuary. I appreciate that our custodians and limited staff have taken time to sit in the sanctuary during taping, but it is just not the same.

I was telling someone that I had a little moment a few weeks ago when I was preaching for the Wednesday midweek Lenten service on The Humbled. As I was preaching, there was a little voice in my head that said, "No one is listening!"

The night before, my family and I had watched the movie "Yesterday." This movie is about an up-andcoming music artist who hits it big when he starts playing songs from The Beatles because by some affect on the world, he is the only one who can remember them. At one point, this young artist travels to Liverpool, England, to research the basis of some of the top hit



songs of The Beatles like "Sergeant Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band" and most specifically, "Eleanor Rigby." I learned that the name Eleanor Rigby was actually a name on a tombstone that was used to create this fictional character the song pays tribute to. But it is a line in that song that spoke to me in my existential moment of preaching: "Father McKenzie, writing the words of a sermon that no one will hear".

"No one is listening!"

These are the words that the devil tried to whisper in my ear in that moment to close my mouth.

But you were listening...

In the days after that midweek Lenten service was streamed on our website, I heard from many of you. God's Word had gone from my mouth out into the world through the work of the Holy Spirit via the internet and had found residence in your ears, and more specifically, came to you in faith.

Friends, social distancing is not what we were created to do. We can certainly physically distance, but we need our social interaction with others—and especially with God. To quote Pastor John in a recent sermon, "Jesus Christ did not social distance." He is present everywhere he needs to be, but most specifically in his Word.

St. Paul reminds us in Romans, chapter 10, that faith comes by what is heard, and in these times where faith is challenged in all kinds of ways, God shows up in His Son and speaks his calming voice of peace and hope into our chaos and our uncertainty. We need to hear what God is saying right now. Otherwise, it is just the voice of the tempter, the great liar who will continue to have voice in the world. Shut him out!

Listen to Christ's promise anew, "And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matt 28:20)

During the month of May, gifts for the special offering envelope will support the Pine Ridge Retreat Center. The Pine Ridge Retreat Center allows those outside of the Pine Ridge community to interact with and learn more about the Lakota people living in Pine Ridge.

The Pine Ridge Reservation is 2.1 million acres and consists of Oglala Lakota County, Bennett County, and the southern half of Jackson County. It is also one of the poorest communities in the United States, with life expectancies of just 47 years for men and 55 years for women. According to the 2010 U.S. Census, 18,834 individuals live on the reservation.

The Pine Ridge Retreat Center lives by the phrase Mitakuye Oyasin, meaning we are all related. People who visit the retreat center will learn more about the Lakota people, visit with them and participate in the community, and address the poverty that exists on the reservation. There is also a religious presence on the reservation and a mission to spread God's word.
