First Lutheran as a "Virtual Church"

When COVID-19 closed the doors of First Lutheran back in March, we knew the church wasn't "closed." We quickly got to work expanding our digital ministry opportunities. While we have been broadcasting our worship services on radio and television since 1978, things have

changed quite a bit since then—and even more so in the last few months.

By the Numbers

Before COVID, our television broadcast on KSFY was watched by about 2,000 households in the viewing area each week. In the past few months, that number has jumped to 2,800-3,100 per week. On Easter Sunday, over 7,000 households joined our worship service on television. And, another 200 or more viewers watch each week on our YouTube channel; over 700 watched Easter worship on YouTube. Worship is also broadcast on 101.9 KELO-FM at 8 a.m. on Sundays. Each week approximately 1,200 households listen via radio. We've received phone calls from people all over the country thanking us for our media broadcasts.



Changes Behind the Scenes

How our service gets to YouTube has changed in a slight but significant way. Just a few months ago, after our 9:30 a.m. service was recorded for KSFY, it was uploaded to YouTube. This is quite the lengthy process. It takes just about as long to upload a video as the video is. That means a worship service takes an hour or more to upload. Now, we stream that service live on YouTube (these days that happens at 8 a.m.). You can join us right at 8, or view the video anytime after that. Visit youtube.com/user/flcsf and subscribe to our channel to get a notification every time we go live or a new video is posted.

Virtual Ministry Updates

While you're on our YouTube channel, you'll notice many more videos beyond our weekly worship services. One of the first things we started when we closed the doors was our FLC Today update videos. These videos are also available on our website at flcsf.org/today.

The weekly pastor's bible study has also continued, without fail, every Wednesday at 10 a.m. The bible study is now offered on Zoom. Additionally, the study is recorded each week and edited and uploaded to our YouTube channel and website (flcsf.org/podcasts) for later viewing. For now, we're continuing this study via Zoom only. However, when we decide to hold the class again in person, we will continue to offer the Zoom option for anyone who wants to join but can't be in the building.

"Come, Lord Jesus" Third (and final) part in a series on Holy Communion

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"There is no point in the Communion service that so effectively vaults me into the company that awaits me on the other side of death as when the pastor prays, 'And so, with the church on earth and the hosts of heaven, we praise your name and join their unending hymn.' It is as if I join them in the feast of victory where the Lord himself 'shall come and serve them.' He serves me the Supper here; he serves them there." (Al Rogness; The Table of Our Lord, p.61)

As marvelous as is this witness by the venerable Dr. Al Rogness, we realize here that all of our language, our categories of space and time (i.e. "here" and "there"), reach their limits in the face of Christ's promise to be truly present in the Lord's Supper ... "in all times and in all places." All that we said about the meaning of Christ's Real Presence, though limited in the August issue of *First Word*, reaches its culmination in the *eschatological character* (Christ's "second coming") of the Lord's Supper.

"And Jesus said to his disciples, I have earnestly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer; for I tell you I shall not eat it again until it is fulfilled in the kingdom of God" (Luke 22:16-17; *RSV*). These words immediately *precede* Jesus' instituting the Sacrament according to St. Luke. St. Paul emphasizes Jesus' concluding of these instituting words: "For as often as you eat of this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes" (I Corinthians 11:26). And so, as the Sacrament of Holy Communion looks back to the Last Supper, so it simultaneously looks forward to the Messianic meal in heaven, the weddingfeast of the future, when Christ as bridegroom and the Church as his bride will be united at the "marriage of the Lamb" (cf. Rev. 19:7, 9; 3:20 and the parables of Jesus in Matt. 22:2f; 25:1f; Mark 2:19; and Hosea 2:21). The Lord's Supper is at the same time a feast of 'remembrance' and a feast of hope—hope for the advent of Christ in glory. But where are the signs, something to hold onto, of his promised coming? (II Peter 3:4).

This can be understood in the Church only, in the Church that gathers as family around the Lord's Table. Just as the Sacrament of Holy Communion bridges over the centuries of the past and makes the death of Christ, that unique historic event, a very present reality, so the Second Advent of Christ is anticipated in the

Sacrament also. One of the oldest liturgical formulas has been preserved, in the Aramaic language of the earliest church, in the "marana-tha" of I Cor. 16:22: "Our Lord, come!" There is a twofold meaning here: 1) the Church prays for Christ's presence in the Sacrament; and 2) the Church prays for the Advent of ushering in his kingdom come. As Jesus came to his disciples at Easter, on the first day of the week and as he came to them again "after eight days," so each Sunday is the "Lord's Day." Christ's final advent (parousia) is anticipated in the celebration of the Lord's Supper because he is present here to his Church. The petition, "Come, Lord Jesus!" is already fulfilled in his Real Presence in the sacrament. And this is the reason why the *Sanctus*, the "Holy, Holy, Holy" (Isa. 6:3; Rev. 4:8), belongs to the Eucharistic liturgy together with the Benedictus: "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest." From the Ancient Church to the Reformation and its Lutheran Confessions to our present time, a "great cloud of witnesses" (Heb. 12:1) testifies to the truth that the Lord's Supper is "heaven on earth."

Therefore, in Christ, the One who holds all things together (Colossians 1:17), we hear these words of blessed assurance as we come to his holy table: "Here I am, truly present in this bread and in this wine, for you: for the forgiveness of sin, for new life and salvation. Yes, for you, the communion of saints, from your baptism

(I Corinthians 10), and into the eternity made possible by my death and resurrection (Romans 6:3f), joined together with those beloved who've gone before you, and who still cheer you on from celestial bleachers." Yes, "marana-tha" ... "Come, Lord Jesus."

And so it is in these days of the COVID-19 pandemic that we earnestly long for the day when we can be back again—shoulder to shoulder—at the Lord's Table. Remembering ... in the present ... that though invisible now in bread and wine, Christ is here. He is not exiled at the "right hand of the Father" alone. His presence is not restricted to the limited and capricious capacities of our hearts and minds only. He is here at the Table, as he promises: "This IS my body; this IS my blood, for you." Yes, let us pray: "Come, Lord Jesus ..."

I am a racing fan and was a stockcar racecar driver for 20 years. I also enjoy fishing, hunting, kayaking, and other sports.



Pastor Jeff Backer led us in comments about what FLCW is and stands for in the light of community needs and global missions. After his prayer, discussion continued about our mission in light of the

pandemic. Many of the following points came from that meeting, and more is to come as we deal with the reopening process at FLC. Here is what we know for now:

- FLCW Board will meet on Thursday, September 3, at 10 a.m., in the Gathering Room.
- Circle chairs are arranging their start up meeting plans and we will publish meeting locations ASAP. For now, all WELCA monthly meetings/programs are postponed.
- JoAnn Gibson, (605) 351-5801, needs quilters in every facet of the work: ironing, sorting, quilting, embroidering, etc. We have the materials you need. This work is a great opportunity for teaching and engaging others in sewing. Requests are coming in for local quilt needs and there are many dish towels available to embroider.
- The stockpile of quilts and other stewardship projects for Lutheran World Relief is low, and a recent shipment of 47,000 items was destroyed in the Beirut explosion. Therefore, Marcia Huffman expresses the following LWR kit needs:
 - → Layettes sleepers size 6 months to 2 years, bath-size Ivory soap, jackets, sweatshirts and sweaters
 - → Health care kits bath size soap, nail clippers, large combs (no rattail) and toothbrushes
- → Dress kits 3 yards of cotton or cotton blend fabric and a spool of matching thread. Bring your donations to the Quilt Center. Cash donations are also welcome. Marcia is an efficient shopper!
- Attic Treasures is making every effort in garage sales to handle what has come in and what we can additionally take. We need helpers in that process.
- The Card Shoppe is open in the Gathering Room area. Please use our card assortment to remember others.
- Coffee! Yes, we have it, along with the other items usually offered! Call Sharyl Wolf, (605) 335-3416, or contact us through the First Lutheran receptionist, (605) 336-3734, and we will follow up with you.
- Bake sales—we would like to reintroduce them in some way ASAP! We are working on a plan.
- Projects that members and volunteers have already completed and prepared will be accommodated in whatever avenue we can find. So, let us know what you have prepared for the annual Fall Bazaar and we will see what we can do to make it available for others to purchase.

As always, keeping our eyes on Jesus, we move forward. We only look back for guidelines for where we can go next.

Caring Conversation

What did you have for lunch today? How many times did the puppy poop (sorry for the somewhat graphic image)? How's it going? What should we have for dinner? These are the repetitive questions I often find myself asking my family

members. Not exactly deep or thought provoking and they really don't give me a lot of insight to anyone's day. When we gather for confirmation or parent nights or board meetings, we might start out sharing the Faith 5 together or with some caring conversation—simple questions that give us a bit of interesting insight into who we are. In this continued time of COVID-19 and not being able to see each other or visit with each other in the way we are accustomed, I thought it might be fun to ask a few congregation/staff members to share some of their answers to some simple yet interesting questions and then you can try these out at home:

What historical sporting event would you like to witness?

Lela: Super Bowl but only if the Packers play. Dave: Daytona 500.

Zachary: Michael Jordan's last shot in game six of the 1998 NBA Finals.

Stephanie: The 1938 match race between Seabiscuit and War Admiral.

What makes you laugh the hardest?

Lela: Little children doing or saying funny things. Dave: Babies laughing or giggling.

Zachary: Sarcasm.

Stephanie: When my son, Zachary, and I get the giggles at the same time about the same silly thing and then he goes into a belly laugh, I start laughing until I'm crying.

How many times do you typically hit the snooze button?

Lela: No times-that would be a disaster. Dave: Once.

Zachary: As many as possible.

Stephanie: I typically hit the snooze button two times (Max says I hit it 2-6 times!).

What are three words to describe yourself?

Lela: Teacher, writer, extrovert. Dave: Positive, happy, thoughtful. Zachary: Introvert, conscientious, strange. Stephanie: Curious, inclusive, authentic.

Loaves and Fishes — John 6:1-14

Dear Third Graders, Parents and Family of First Lutheran Church:

When I was just about your age, in third grade, one of my favorite Bible stories was the story of "Jesus Feeding the Five Thousand." (Please take a couple of minutes now and read from John 6:1-14 in your Bibles. And remember, the Bible is God's love story for you, and to share it.)

Picture those hundreds of people who'd been following Jesus for many miles, perhaps days. Why? The Bible says that they'd heard Jesus' stories/parables of God's great love for them and seen how he could heal sick people by simply saying a word. (Read John 5:2-9). Wow! So, you can imagine how excited they were to witness all these miracles of Jesus, so much so, they even forgot to eat. But then, they began to realize how hungry they were. ("Grumble, grumble. Gurgle, gurgle.") Has this ever happened to you - where you get so excited about something you forget to eat? When I was your age that always happened on Christmas Eve!

And so, Jesus asks one of his disciples, Philip: "How are we going to feed all these people? There are hundreds of folks who've been following us on the way, without having anything to eat." Well, there weren't HyVee grocery stores back in Jesus' time, and the disciples were feeling pretty hopeless about the situation. Another disciple, Andrew then said: "There's a young lad here who has 5 loaves of bread and 2 fish; but that's not going to be enough!" (Read v.9 again.).

The disciples must have been thinking to themselves: "Five loaves and two fish? To feed more than five thousand people?! Impossible. Kid can't count. Won't work. Send him home!" But ... before they could say




Mosaic, The Church of the Multiplication of the Loaves and the Fishes, 4th century, Israel

anything, Jesus had all the people – some 5,000 in number – sit down on a grassy hill on the northern shoreline of Lake Galilee (Read v.10 again). Now, listen carefully here to what Jesus is saying to the young lad: "Son, can I have your simple gifts of 5 loaves and 2 fish? I know they don't look like a big deal in the world's eyes. But, if you place these simple gifts in my hands I will take them, and bless them, and break them, and give them, and thousands will be fed." (Do these words sound familiar? Think about "The Words of Institution" that we hear, just before we celebrate communion in worship.) The young lad placed them in Jesus' hands. He blessed them. And thousands of people were fed. And there were even 12 big baskets of food left over! Once again, the people were amazed at the way Jesus' words could work such miracles: turning an impossible situation into the possibility of a great blessing of God.

So, I'd like to have you think about some of the simple gifts YOU have. (Just take a moment to do so.) Gifts like being a good listener, fixing things, helping an elderly neighbor mow his lawn. For Jesus is saying, "If you place your simple gifts in my hands, for the sake of the needs of others (read Matthew 25:40), I will take these gifts, and bless them, and break them, and give them, and thousands will be fed." But the most precious, simple gift of all, is to share with people who are hurting is a very, very special word: one that will go and fill those deep empty or hungry places we so often feel in our lives. And that word is "Jesus," who is the Word of God, who still speaks through YOU. Tell people: "You are God's precious child and upon you God's forgiving/ claiming/ and loving word will last forever. It will not run out. Twelve baskets full."

Whatever those simple gifts might be that you share with others, share them together with Jesus' claiming and enfolding Word, that they are precious in God's sight, and beloved by God for always. And in that one simple word, in Jesus, he will use your gifts and ... take and bless and break and give them, and thousands will be fed. Wow!


Capital Campaign Update

When I spoke with Marilyn McNeill about the amount that was paid towards the HVAC loan in the month of July, I shouted out loud when I hung up the phone, "PRAISE GOD! PRAISE GOD from WHOM ALL BLESSINGS FLOW!" In July the church was able to pay \$33,065 on the HVAC loan, bringing the amount still needed to be paid to \$672,224.

In the ten months since the campaign started, the church has paid almost \$800,000 on the loan. This is awesome! Of those ten months, the campaign has been on hiatus for five months. No phone calls were made to arrange visits.

I'm so grateful for the amount we have paid, which in turn reduces the interest payments the church needs to make on the loan. I'm grateful for the prayers the congregation has offered for this campaign, and I'm grateful to all of you leading the way to pay on this debt. PRAISE GOD!

Keeping Our Commitments

"This is what the LORD has commanded. When a man makes a vow to the LORD, or swears an oath to bind himself by a pledge, he shall not break his word..." Numbers 30:1-2

When coronavirus hit back in March, decisions were made to proceed cautiously with our budgeted programing and commitments until we had a clearer picture of what things would look like through the following weeks and months.

God was faithful, and so were you!

Unlike what we have heard from many of our nonprofit ministry relationships, you have kept the ministries and mission of First Lutheran Church moving along. Another exceptional benefit to our congregation was qualifying for the PPP loan. These opportunities have allowed First Lutheran to remain steady financially. While we remain cautious, we have looked at the ways we can conservatively keep our commitments to our ministry partners.

I am offering this accounting as a transparent communication to you so you would know that important ministry work continues, and that so far, we have kept our commitments. These disbursements are discussed and approved by the Evangelism & Outreach board. Many of these support gifts combine monies available from budgeted and designated funds. Designated funds are usually acquired by individual gifts from parishioners, memorials, special offerings, etc.

The E&O board works hard to be sure the ministry partners we support are reflective of the desires of the congregation and are reflective of the abundant gifts First Lutheran is given. We have prioritized your gifts being put to work especially in our local community.
