

Marriage, Martyrs, and Mysteries of the Faith: Echoes of the Reformation in 1523, 500 Years Later



Jason Burggraff, Senior Pastor Lent at First: Grasped by the Gospel Echoes of the Reformation

"The most precious gift of the Church is God's Word. Not our power, our

numbers, our money, our reputation before men makes the church great. But the church is great because it speaks the Word of God. That Word is that Jesus Christ died for our sins and rose again. Through that Word God moves mightily among us to save and keep us and to save all the men who are His." Richard Caemmerer, Secretary and Dean of Chapel at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis Missouri, 1960.

At one point in my previous call here at First Lutheran Church (FLC), our church library records were being cleaned up. Being more of a saver than a thrower, I "rescued" from the trash heap a folder that contained a collection of 11 letters from well-known Seminary Professors of the American Lutheran Church (ALC) and Missouri Synod Lutheran Church. These theologians were invited to write imaginary letters from Martin Luther to pastors of the ALC on the jubilee occasion of the formation of the ALC in 1960 (to which FLC belonged). All 11 letters are interesting, but there is one that I keep coming back to which I believe has much to say for us today, 63 years after it was written, and 36 years after the

ALC merged with the LCA to form the ELCA. That is the letter I quoted at the beginning of this article.

Some of you may remember the First Lutheran of 1960. In this quote, Caemmerer astutely observes that in 1960 (and today, I would add!) while there are many parts of the institution of our church to which we will pay attention (our power, numbers, money, reputation before people), none are as precious and central as God's own Word, fulfilled in Jesus Christ. The Lutheran reformers were so clear about this point that they taught that the true unity of the Church is based solely on the pure preaching of the Gospel, and the right administration of the sacraments of Holy Baptism and the Lord's Supper. (Augsburg Confession, Article VII). Can you imagine that through all these years, this alone is what makes the Church (by the power of the Holy Spirit, of course)? If you can, then you might be a Lutheran!

And so along with God's children through baptism here at First, I take great joy in the call to teach and preach God's Word for you and with you, because I know that when God's Word goes out, it does not come back empty, but accomplishes that for which it is sent. (Isaiah 55) It is effective at forgiving sin and bringing new life to your old Adam or Eve, where you may see only difficulty and death around you. What joy it is to have been given this hope of new life through Christ! And while the echoes of this proclamation come to us not only from 500 years ago and 2000 years ago, it is brand new as we preach and hear it today!

In that vein, as we are brought into the season of Lent, I invite you to read the devotions and attend our midweek services this Lent. Each week we'll be taking a look at a slice of the Reformation in the year 1523. (preaching themes include: marriage, martyrs, baptism, hymnody, and Luther translating the Old Testament) Come, see, and hear how with scripture, preaching, and music, these services will speak to our day and our situation now in 2023.

Sinners like you and me are bound to try to trust all sorts of false gods in this old world, and so we need this new life in Christ. Know that it is here for you.

Caemmerer concludes in his last point: "The world will not last forever. The kings and princes of the world must fail. The entire world, however great and noble, goes to its end. Our business is to keep each other firm in the faith through the Word of God, in our families and churches, until Christ returns to take us home."

While this world will not last forever (nor our power, numbers, money or reputations), as you hear God's Word, you are home already in faith, in Christ's promise for you today. May you hear it clearly and often in the days ahead, for Christ has moved mightily to give you eternal life!

Capital Campaign Update

We received great news that the sound system design will be received at First Lutheran on Wednesday, February 8. A team led by James

Moore and Zachary Brockhoff will review the plans with the sound design team. If changes are necessary, they will be made and reviewed again by First Lutheran. Then the sound design plan will go out for bids. The bidding process takes 30 days. At that point the sound

design company will review the bids and check references from the bidders. The church will receive the bids and the review made by the design company. The church will make the final decision regarding the bidder that best fits First Lutheran. After the bidder is selected, then the implementation time window will depend on equipment lead time and contractor scheduling. The project will be completed in 2023, hopefully no later than September/October. You will begin to see art work going up on the walls of the Atrium in the near future. The reception desk will begin sometime in the first 2 weeks of March. We are getting closer to completing the priority list of projects for the campaign.

Council Highlights: January 2023

- We doubled our offerings in December and therefore came in better than budgeted revenue for 2022.
- Offerings have been on a downward trend for the past few years. Due to current inflation rates, expenses will likely increase. For the 2023 budget, an additional \$113k was added to actual (current) pledge numbers to compare to recent years pledges vs. actual giving. The 2023 proposed budget shows a loss to be covered by the 2022 surplus.
- Council is comfortable with the 2023 budget but has concerns for 2024 and beyond if revenues continue to decline while expenses continue to increase.
- Pr. Dave served with FLC for just over 13 months, and his final day with FLC was January 31. He is looking forward to the Holy Land trip in April and is hoping to take some time off. He noted that in the past year, we've accomplished nearly every task we set out to do. The new security system is almost complete, and the Sanctuary sound system is in the works and will hopefully be in by the end of the year.
- Pr. Jason thanked Pr. Dave for his time here and has appreciated their overlap time. Though his time here has been short, Pr. Jason has been taking a lot in learning the systems of FLC.
- The big construction project left in the Atrium is the reception desk. Ordered parts are now on their way. Construction is expected to begin in March.
- Nominating committee work in the final weeks leading up to the annual meeting was a bit of a roller coaster. Three individuals resigned from the Youth and Family board as did two at-large members for the executive committee. The nominating committee was able to fill open roles in time for the annual meeting.
