"...you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things." Matthew 16:23

The Church is nothing other than

the Holy Spirit gathering you around the preaching of God's Word and the Sacraments (Article 7 of the Augsburg Confession). Because of this, we regard God's Word and the preaching of it as holy and gladly hear and learn it! (Luther's explanation to the 3rd Commandment in the small catechism.) Having said that, I can recall a few Sunday mornings when I was not glad to get up and go to church, especially as a young boy...in fact my mom left me home one Sunday morning, which I thought was great until she came to pick me up later for choir and charged me a quarter for the extra driving! Yet then and even now some days, I, and I suspect we, are consumed by the cares of this world—work, family, sleep, house, food, friends-all important things by the way, but none can deliver forgiveness of sins, life, or salvation, and the peace that comes with Christ. For this peace, God has gathered you together in the Church so that you may receive Christ and his Word.

As school has begun in late August, and as summer begins shifting to fall, there seem to be many things to tend to: changing family schedules, continued work in the yard or garden, football season (among other sports and activities!). Teachers have been busy in the classroom since early August. In the Church too, there has been a flurry of preparation: Sunday and Wednesday School, Choirs, Choir School

and musical ensembles, Confirmation, Youth Group, Milestones, Outreach and Evangelism opportunities, preparation for Stewardship and Adult Bible Studies... there is much to do. Yet doing will not bring peace. All of these activities are good. They are blessings in fact, especially when they support and are centered on God's Word for us in Christ. What a gift it is to have talented staff and volunteers to dream, organize, and passionately lead the cornucopia of opportunities we have to gather together at First Lutheran Church.

Yet always, we are brought back to the center of the wheel, who is Jesus Christ, and his salvation. We are brought back to Christ because we often stray. As our Gospel readings of the summer with many stories of wheat, weeds, feeding the 5,000, and walking on water move to the fall, we will hear a more intense tone, anticipating Christ's death and need and power of forgiveness. I'm reminded of what Jesus says to Peter in the Gospel reading for Sunday, September 3, after Peter tells Jesus that he must never be killed: "But he turned to Peter, 'Get behind me, Satan!' You are a stumbling block to me; for you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things." Whoa Jesus, we might think—for Peter is just trying to protect you...and perhaps himself. Yet God's Word both kills and raises up... something Peter did not yet know and something we also forget. Too often we get stuck trying to avoid this Word of God and fill our lives with all sorts of other things. We get consumed by our schedule, our to-do list, sleeping in or getting up early, being lazy, or being busy. Too often we believe the solution is to slow down or speed up, depending on where our problems seem to lie. Yet Christ now says: "those who want to save their

life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it" (Matthew 16:25). Even this we want to turn into our own activity, but rest assured, this is the work of God on you, as you hear his Word, through the Holy Spirit: losing your old life to Christ and being saved. Hearing this Word is why we have the Church—in fact this is the Church.

That's not to say you won't be used up in many activities—in fact you will. We have many such opportunities for you to serve in worship as ushers, readers, communion servers, singers, musicians, camera operators, and more. There are places waiting for you to help with our many youth and family, music and outreach programs, including helping serve Wednesday Night Meals, coffee and prayer, quilting, and volunteering in the shop and around the property. As Church on the Street has relocated from the campus of First Lutheran to The Multicultural Center, we face new opportunities to serve those in need in our own downtown neighborhood, along with many other ways to reach out to those in our community. We have a group of faithful pray-ers, who lift up the whole ministry each week to God's leading and purpose. I invite you to join them in your prayers, especially as we continue the work of calling two new pastors and filling important staff positions. Yet underneath and over it all is God's Word in Christ, who takes away your sin and makes you free—not because of what you do, but because of what Jesus has done for you.

To hear this Word, which binds us together in forgiveness, come. Come to worship, hear the Word, receive the sacrament of baptism (if you haven't yet been baptized), and receive the Lord's Supper (every week).

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For more of this Word, come to Bible Study as we gather around Scripture. We'll continue to gather for Bible Study in FLCW Circles, our Wednesday morning Text Study at 10 a.m. each week, and for the weekly Men's Bible Study on Thursday

mornings at 7:30 a.m. I'll also be adding a couple more Adult Bible Studies this fall: one on Thursdays at noon and one on either Wednesday or Thursday evenings, times pending.

Take heart and know now that it's Christ

who will set your mind on heavenly things, who will make you his own, not by what you do, but by giving you faith to trust his Word. It is here, on God's Word, that our foundation is set. Thanks be to



# **Addressing Budget Concerns Amid Falling Attendance**

In the heart of our community stands First Lutheran Church, a place of solace, worship, and fellowship for generations. Yet, like many places of worship across the nation, First Lutheran is facing a significant challenge—a decline in attendance. As we witness empty pews and dwindling congregational numbers, it's imperative that we address the impact of falling attendance on the church's budget and explore strategies to ensure the continuity of our mission.

#### **Embracing Reality: Falling Attendance**

In recent years, it's become evident that the world around us is changing. As societal norms shift and priorities erode, traditional attendance at religious services has been on a decline. First Lutheran Church is not immune to this trend. Younger generations, in particular, have shown different patterns of engagement with organized religion, leading to a reduction in weekly attendees.

### **Budget Blues: How Falling Attendance Affects Finances**

The interplay between attendance and the church's budget is intricate. Historically, the contributions from our congregation have provided the financial foundation for

various ministries, clergy salaries, maintenance of our beautiful sanctuary, and the community programs that define our outreach. As attendance wanes, so does the flow of donations, which can lead to financial strain. First Lutheran is blessed beyond blessed in four areas specifically that have lessened the impact of falling attendance. The four areas specifically are:

- 1. Very generous giving by families who attend regularly.
- 2. GREAT property investments that generate revenue (Starbucks and leased parking).
- 3. Benefiting from a healthy and

incredibly well-managed foundation.

4. The church is currently free of debt combined with frugal, conservative spending.

#### Crafting a Solution: Strategies to Navigate Budget Concerns

While the challenge might be daunting, First Lutheran Church has the opportunity to rise above it by embracing innovative strategies and thoughtful adaptations. Here are some approaches to consider:

#### 1. Transparent Communication:


Open and honest communication with the congregation is crucial. Sharing the financial realities of the church helps foster a sense of ownership and responsibility within the community. Transparency can encourage increased support and donations from those who are still involved.

2. Diversified Revenue Streams: Relying solely on traditional tithes and offerings can be risky when attendance is declining. Exploring alternative revenue streams like hosting community events, renting out spaces, or starting small businesses within the church premises can provide additional income.

- 3. Cost Cutting and Efficiency: Careful financial management is essential. Review the budget and identify areas where costs can be reduced without compromising the quality of services. This might involve reevaluating staff roles, renegotiating contracts, or finding more cost-effective ways to maintain the building.
- 4. Embracing Technology: In today's digital age, technology can bridge the gap between the church and the younger generation. Utilize social media, live streaming, and online giving platforms to connect with those who might not attend in person but still want to support the church financially.

Building relationships with other churches or community organizations can lead to shared resources and joint initiatives that benefit both the church and the community.




A loss of 26.69% from 2016 to 2019-in 3 YEARS- This is before COVID.


#### A Unified Journey Forward

# Farewell (but not goodbye) to our friends in Ministry: COTS

Church on the Street is grateful for the relationship we have with you in Christ, who has called us together to share the gospel, especially

with those experiencing homelessness and poverty here in Sioux Falls. Through the years, you have shared prayers, space, in-kind donations, and financial contributions that allow us to grow and ask where the Spirit is calling us next.

Last year a partnership between Lutheran Social Services and the Multi-Cultural Center began that transitioned those who officed at Multi-Cultural Center into LSS, leaving valuable office space available. During the week, the 515 N Main Ave

office space is accessible by entering the heart of the county building where our folks often access health care at Falls



Community Health. The Career Closet relocated too, and now we rent that space

filling it with food and other essential items to serve even more families and individuals. Earlier this year, we fed about 20 families a month, and now we provide for over 100.

We continue to worship at Heritage Park and inside the LSS Multi-Cultural Center, do laundry at the laundromat at Cliff and 3rd, provide pastoral care at Bishop Dudley and, of course, meet with folks on the street too. Our donation bin is still waiting for your generous donations of backpacks, seasonally appropriate clothing, and other new and gently used items, but it is now located in the atrium by the elevator.

Thank you for your continuing prayers and support of Church on the Street!

### **Delta Dental Success!**

Did you see it? The quilters saw it! The men in the woodshop saw it! The staff saw it! What did they see? They all saw the

Delta Dental Bus that was in the First Lutheran parking lot July 17-20. Did you see it too?

First Lutheran hosted the Delta Dental Mobile Program, which provides oral health services (preventive, diagnostic, and restorative care) to children through age 21, at no cost to the child or family. The Care & Health Board paid a \$3,000 stipend to be the site partner with Delta Dental of South Dakota, but the cost to operate the Bus each week is over \$14,000. The program bills insurance and Medicaid, if available, with the balance

being paid by Delta Dental of South Dakota. The bus, called Molar 1, came to Sioux Falls and was staffed with a dentist, hygienist, two dental assistants, and a coordinator.

In April, First Lutheran began advertising for patients to make appointments, and the schedule was filled before the bus arrived. Calls continued to come in during the week of treatment, and the children had to be referred to another site in Sioux Falls later in the summer. That clearly shows the need for these dental services in our community.

The bus pulled into the parking lot at noon on Monday and began seeing patients at 1 p.m. Appointments were scheduled every ten minutes until 5:30 p.m. and again Tuesday morning from 8 to 11:30 a.m. The patients had exams and x-rays on the bus and then went to the Trinity Room, where the hygienist was set up to do cleanings and oral hygiene

care. If additional treatments were needed (fillings or extractions), appointments were made for them to return Tuesday afternoon, Wednesday, or Thursday. Fifty children were seen and received various levels of care during the week Delta Dental was at First Lutheran. Five children needed to be referred to outside dentists for more extensive treatment.

The children were delightful! They waited patiently in the Atrium for their appointments and spent their time coloring pictures and drawing, which many of them shared with us. There was some anxiety in the room, and some wrinkled noses after fluoride treatments due to the taste, but the children were all so well behaved.

This is such an important program for children in South Dakota, and the Care & Health Board is proud to be associated with the Delta Dental Mobile Program. Praise be to God!


