Two Thumbs-up

Dear Family Members and Friends of First Lutheran:

The Wise Men and Women of First Lutheran's Call Committee had since mounted their camels and headed home, back East. And now in early

January of 2001, in a little university town that lies cradled in the Rocky Mountains of Bozeman, MT ... 'Twas a couple of weeks after Christmas and all through the house' ... there were creatures scurrying. John Andrew and Matt were running back and forth through the kitchen, then to the garage, stoking our van with skies, snow boards, and that all-important collection of gear they fondly referred to as their "stuff." It was a wintry Saturday morning. And in our household, that usually meant a ski day at Bridger Bowl. "Hurry up, Sarah!" the boys exclaimed, "Are you like, going, or not?!"

But for once in her life, Sarah was more interested in staying at the breakfast table with Mom and Dad. For she was rather intrigued with why Cathy was redirecting this question to me and why it was that Dad's heart sounded like an old tennis shoe bouncing around in the dryer. "Well, John," said Cathy. "Are you like, going, or not?" Cathy then went on to explain to Sarah how you, the members of First Lutheran, had sent a "Letter of Call"—inviting me and the family to serve as your next Senior Pastor in Sioux Falls.

Despite Montana's being her cradling state, Sarah's face began to shine through some hesitant tears—shining with an eight-year-old's smile that held two wonderfully gapped front teeth—big and white as Chiclets. And then slowly, Sarah leaned across the table, making a liturgical sign of two-thumbs up. And Cathy asked: "What does that mean?" Sarah's response: "Well ... like ... it's all I've got!" I took this to mean that she was giving a "Yes!" with all she had: "Two-thumbs up!" As the prophet, Isaiah foretold: "And a little child shall lead them" (Isaiah 11:6).

And so, it has been my response as well, over these past twenty years—"It's all I've got"—in response to God's calling through you, "two-thumbs up" ... pressing my deep passions for Pastoral Care, Bible Studies-n-Teaching-n-Writing, Music and the Arts, as well as my doctoral studies in Theology from University of Chicago and Harvard days, into the service of Christ's Church among you: an incredibly gracious and gifted "priesthood of ALL believers." Yes, in the name of the One who gave his ALL for us, everything he had (Philippians 2:5-11), with two thumbs-up, pointing heavenward on a cross, "in order that the world might have life, and have it abundantly" (John 10:10b). Thank you for the privilege of "leading from the middle" of your marvelous diversity of talents as Christ's "communion of saints" ... steeped in a rich legacy of now 100 years in Worship & Music, Pastoral Care, Christian Education, Mission Outreach, special events such as The Bazaar, Hymn Festivals, and Advent/Christmas Music Sundays, and the incredibly gifted pastoral and professional staff ... as well as the amazing capital campaigns that have expanded our footprint for evangelism and outreach, not only downtown but across our city and around God's globe with an amazing heritage of grace that still lives on.

Thank you for the chance to experience the spirited serendipity of a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity, to

be in ministry with my beloved parents, Pastor Jim (Visitation) and Dorothy (Director of Women's Choir and Agape Bells), together with other amazing Directors of Music in Dr. Jerry Hanson, Brian Johnson, Michael Elsbernd, and the young Wunderkind, Zachary Brockhoff and the many, many amazing musicians and ensembles such as Ninepatch Praise Band and Dakota Road—with a vast variety of liturgies and genres—all in "making a joyful sound unto the Lord" (Psalm 98:4; 100). Indeed, "Next to Holy Scripture, music deserves the highest praise," mused Martin Luther. And to my cherished colleague and spouse of 42-plus years, Cathy ... who has been a quiet but

steady presence in the background, supporting me and our congregation by her hosting Advent Dinners for the staff each year, teaching Sunday School, playing in the Agape Bells, singing in the Women's Choir, or serving on the recent Parament Committee. And especially in these concluding days, leading up to my last Sunday with you on December 12 ... Thank you, for your many prayers and expressions of love and support, as Cathy and I now continue to walk through the valley of the shadow of an ALS diagnosis ... but mindful that "Thou art with us" (Psalm 23:4).

It was a long time ago that the words "God be with you" disappeared into the word "goodbye." However, every now and again, some trace of them still glimmers through. Such is today. To draw upon the parting words of St. Paul to the church at Philippi in Macedonia, and as I give leave to a consecrated ministry together with Cathy, in furthered chaplaincy work, music and writing ...

"Grace and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. I give thanks in all my remembrances of you, always in every prayer of mine for you, all making my prayer with joy, thankful for your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now. And I am sure that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ." (Philippians 1:2-6; RSV. Cf. Psalm 90:12)

Capital Campaign Update

The church is getting current prices for work that needs to be completed to address safety issues, building integrity, and equipment in need of replacing.

The tuck pointing of the bell tower and north side of the church are immediate needs. The cost for this portion of the tuck pointing is \$121,000. This project will get started late spring. The tuck pointing of the south and east sides of the church will cost \$109,000. The start of this project will be dependent on raising needed funds.

The Atrium is the next project we will tackle, as a great deal of the funding for this project has been pledged and/or received. This would involve moving the reception desk, something the Sioux Falls Police felt was a safety issue. This would also include moving the internal Atrium doors farther into the building, creating storage space, and brightening the area toward Reformation Hall. The cost for this area will be approximately \$150,000.

Next on the list will be replacing the sanctuary sound system. Our current sound system has some major issues. We know updating of this system will increase the sound of both the spoken and sung word each week.

The final safety issue is the sanctuary ceiling. This is the costliest project that we have to fund. We are looking at approximately \$750,000. Originally, we had anticipated a cost of \$650,000, but as you may know, construction costs have increased significantly since COVID-19.

We will not be able to complete the above issues—which are truly necessities and not just wishes—unless additional families make a pledge to the campaign. My name is Pastor Chris Matson, and I am thrilled to accept the call to be the next pastor of Church on the Street and partner with First Lutheran Church! Over the past five years, I've been a pastor at Peace Lutheran

Church in Sioux Falls. When I learned Pastor Rebel was leaving Church on the Street, I felt the Spirit's call tugging me here.

Here's a bit of my backstory: I grew up in a church in the suburbs of Columbus, Ohio, that provided meals to folks experiencing hunger and accompanied those living with HIV/AIDS in Hospice Homes. These experiences led me to earn a Bachelor of Social Work from Capital University, where I discerned that God was calling me to publicly announce that God loves all people because every person is created in the image of God. After college, I spent a year in Milwaukee at All People's Church as a member of Lutheran Volunteer Corps, coordinating partnerships between suburban partners with the inner-city ministry that shared God's love with kids and families.

Most recently, I served as Associate Pastor at Lutheran Church of Our Redeemer from 2008 to 2016 and at Peace Lutheran Church from 2016 to the present, coordinating worship, servant opportunities, and church partnerships such as Church on the Street. In addition to continuing to maintain and build relationships with congregations in the South Dakota Synod, I am also committed to working with other denominations and other faiths, and I serve on the South Dakota Faith and Public Life board, dedicated to interfaith dialogue seeking peace and justice for the common good.

My first official day is Monday, November 15. As always, the staff and worship leaders at Church on the Street are hard at work sharing God's goodness and love in this time of transition. I welcome the opportunity to meet the community of First Lutheran and share stories of God's work in our world!

During the month of December, our special offerings will go to support Center of Hope, The Community

Outreach, and The Furniture Mission.



The Center of Hope and The Community Outreach recently moved to the former School for the Deaf campus. They are settling into a different neighborhood.

The Center of Hope walks alongside individuals to bring them spiritual and physical health and to ultimately change our community one life at a time. They are a Christian outreach to the working poor.



They provide bikes for work, bus passes, low-priced clothing, computer and phone access, and pastoral care. The Center is a safe haven for people to come as they are. Winter clothing of all sizes is needed, as well as bikes for transportation and monetary funds to help with purchasing photo IDs and bus passes.

The Community Outreach's mission is partnering to share hope and provide tools for daily living. They



are working to help individuals attain self-sufficiency and trying to help prevent homelessness. The number of individuals seeking help has increased this year. During these trying times, the way of life for many has changed. There have been 8,500 requests for assistance with housing and rent. Many families have been unable

to pay their utility bills, choosing to pay for necessities first. They offer a Genesis Mentoring program that strives to teach families about budgeting, life skills, and goals. Currently, they are in need of funds for assisting with utility bills, items for Sharing Christmas, and their birthday store. Volunteers are needed for their Genesis Mentoring program as well.

The Furniture Mission demonstrates the love of Christ,

providing individuals in need with gently used furniture and household items. A comfortable home provides dignity, security, and a better environment to raise a family. With the COVID-19 pandemic, they have had many



changes in accepting and distributing furniture. The Department of Corrections can no longer send inmates to help with incoming items. Currently, only curbside pickup and delivery are offered, creating hardships for elderly individuals. The Furniture Mission has a great need for all types of furniture and household items trying to replenish stock. Beds are the most needed item at this time.

Please remember these local missions in your prayers, and if you are able to donate your time, bikes, clothing, furniture, or money—you are helping fellow members of our community. The Lord himself goes before you and will be with you; he will never leave you nor forsake you.
