Lent 2021 — This We Believe: Reflections on the Apostles' Creed

The season of the church called Lent has long served the church as time set aside to reflect on baptism as our connection to the cross, Jesus, and his empty tomb. That brings a bit of somberness to the season that is sometimes mistaken for being no fun. In reality, however, even though the seasonal music and liturgy are

less exuberant, we are invited to learn more deeply about the new life that God has given us in Christ.

The 40 days of Lent are broken up each week with a Sunday that celebrates fully Jesus' resurrection. That means that even if the tone of music and the decorations in the sanctuary communicate solemnity, the good news of Christ's resurrection breaks through to our ears.

Lent has traditionally been a time of self-denial, and therefore, people often chose to "give up something for Lent." This should not be seen as a time of selfimprovement, but rather as time to give up an excess in order to notice how many other blessings God has given. In giving up something extra, we come to see how God provides even in time of having less. This is the reason churches or families might choose to have a weekly soup and bread supper, or eat fish on Fridays, rather than preparing a full meal with all the trimmings. It's not a weight loss diet nor a chance to show how humble one ought to be, but rather to see God's blessings even in the simple things of life. Unfortunately, due to this year's circumstances, we will not be having meals at church, but you are encouraged to take up this practice in your home in some way.

Baptism instruction has also been traditionally part of a congregation's life. Lent is a time to teach the Christian faith, especially to new believers. The instruction throughout Lent then leads directly to baptism at Easter (or the Easter season). Thus, instruction and baptism, Lent and Easter, death and resurrection, are the shape of the Christian life.

This year, First Lutheran will have a study on the Apostles' Creed during our Wednesday worship services, and we will teach our 5th graders about the Lord's Supper in preparation for First Communion. Please watch for details about how you can receive the daily devotions, scriptures, and prayers that will accompany us all through this season.


The Apostles' Creed

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"A Transfigured Reflection For Valentine's Day"

(Based on Mark 9:2-9)

This year in the Church Calendar, the "Transfiguration of Our Lord Sunday" (the last Sunday of Epiphany) falls on ... of all dates in February ... February 14. Perhaps better known on many an American calendar as ... yup, you guessed it: Valentine's Day. And so, a brief story as it comes together with the Spirit

of our gospel text for the second Sunday in February: Mark 9:2-9.

Sometimes after a long, hard day, I like to come home and make my way *up* the foyer steps, *up* to the highest point, where my wife, Cathy's office is tucked away, *up* above our garage. And in that study is a set of book cases and cabinets filled with treasures made by our little trinity, John Andrew, Sarah, and Matt: drawings, letters and poems, sculptures and carvings. And in one of these cabinets, there's a thin place that holds a now rather thin but precious treasure (thin enough to just slip right into your heart). It's a little shoebox that once belonged to my daughter, Sarah. Size 12, if I remember right. No, not the size of a future star on Stanford's Girls' Volleyball Team; but rather, the size of a young first grader's heart that shines through all the thin places when our lives become dark and thick with anything but gladness.

Some twenty-two years ago now, in her first grade class in Montana, Sarah had taken this old shoebox and decorated it for me. A Valentine's gift for Dad. First, there are the standard colors of construction paper: red,

white, and pink...

all rather faded now.

Then there's the spritzing of aluminum foil, several paper doilies, gumdrops, jellybeans, and some of those little colored candy hearts.

You know...the ones with the silly sayings on them that taste like *Tums*. And then, finally the whole thing is held together by that infamous what-would-we-otherwise-ever-do-without

Elmer's Glue. Which, by the Gummy Box Girl way, also tastes like Tums! I call Sarah's Size "12" Valentine: the GUMMY BOX. I mean, it sticks to you in a special kind of way.

Sadly, however, this sticky icon isn't looking too very good these days (like my grammar.) It looks rather like, to borrow an expression from yesteryear: "Gross!" By this I mean, most of the jellybeans and gumdrops have coagulated into a kind of ... well ... you really would need some Tums. And unfortunately, in our move to Sioux Falls, now some 19 years ago ... the GUMMY BOX got smooshed. Smooshed! Won't find the word in Webster's; but it's a verb, passive, I think ... meaning "made thin under heavy pressure." However, if you lift the lid off this little thin box, you'll begin to know why it is that I still hold onto it. For on folded fragile pieces of lined, large school paper, there are words like, "Hi, Daddio", "Hoppy Valemtimes" and lots of "I Love Yous (with little hearts)." And there are still five red gummy bears stuck to the bottom of this box representing our

family. Also scrawled in several places are the names of all three children, along with some of my favorite photos of them as children. A veritable, Valentine treasure box. Ah, the treasure-box in Johnny Depp and Hector Barbossa's *Pirates of the Caribbean*, are nothing in the face of this gummy wonder!

And so, after those long, hard days when I'm feeling a little bit smooshed myself, I climb the stairs and go into this small, *thin* place, to get out the GUMMY BOX ... put it in my hands ... and somehow feel *transfigured* by it all ... knowing the love that it represents. It's rather sacramental, you know, in a sense – something I can touch, and hold, and believe in ... especially when love gets difficult and there are no more small arms hugging my neck anymore.

"Sappy," you say? Well, all of you who've been gifted with a GUMMY BOX by a beloved child, know it's a treasure trove more valuable than any amount of gold. *So, like, hey ... just*

bury it with me, for I want to take it with me as far as I can go.

In our Gospel Lesson for Valentine's Day, or should I say, "the last Sunday of Epiphany," we see that Jesus has also come to a *thin place* – standing exhausted// at a crossroads// at the foot of a mountain. Standing between his baptism on the one hand, and his

crucifixion on the other. For two years now, since being baptized by John in the Jordan (Mark 1:9-11), Jesus has poured himself out into all the thick places of life: teaching people about the radical good news of God's grace, about turning all kinds of legalism on-its-head (Mk. 2:15-17, 27; 3:1-6), healing and raising all who felt like deadbeats (Mk. 1:32-45; 2:1-12; 5:35-43), feeding thousands (Mk. 6:30-44; 8:1-12). And just eight days before his – now standing at the foot of a mountain – of Transfiguration – we look back just a few verses in Mark's gospel to get our bearings (Mk. 8:27-38) - where Jesus pauses lakeside at Bethsaida with the disciples, in order to ask an all-important question: "Who do people say that I am?" (Mk. 8:27). Their answer: "John the Baptist; but others say, Elijah; and others, that one of the old prophets has risen" (Mk. 8:28). Well, they got it wrong! But then, from probably the most thick-headed and stubborn of the disciples, prompted by the Holy Spirit, Peter blurts out: "You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God" (Mk. 8:29). Jesus then tells them that to be the Messiah means suffering, rejection, and even death in order to fulfill God's plan of salvation. And that was a tough *Tums* to swallow, indeed. The last thing anyone wanted to hear. So it was, for the Son of God, if he's also truly the Son of Man ... as we sing and confess in the wellbeloved hymn, Beautiful Savior ... "by whose stripes of suffering we are healed" (cf. Isa. 53:5).

And so Jesus takes three of his disciples – James and John and Peter – *up* the stairs of the mountain, *up* away from all the distractions of voices so that they might hear "that still, small voice of God", *up* into the *thin places* where the mountain top enabled them to peek *up* into heaven, *up* into the silence of a place where Jesus could take the *thin places* and hold them between his hands, the *Gummy Box of Prayer*, to find courage inside ... "for courage is fear that has said its prayers" (Anne Lamott; *Traveling Mercies*, p.239). Jesus needed to know ... "Father, is this the way that I must walk? The way to Jerusalem, that *via Delarosa* ... the way

of sorrow...the way of crucifixion. Is this truly your way of salvation in the world?" It was a question upon which the divine answer soon would hang. On another mountain named Calvary.

And how did God answer Jesus? What a mountain! What a moment! What a message! Truly, it was that proverbial "mountain top experience." Listen to the Gospel Lesson again: "And Jesus was transfigured before the three disciples, and his face shone like the sun, and his garments became white as light. And behold, there appeared Moses and Elijah, talking with him" (Mark 9:4). And then, a cloud ... what the Jewish people knew from the Exodus time as a consecrated sense of God tabernacling with them (Exodus 13:21-22), called a Shekinah, that is "the dwelling presence of God" ... they were surrounded once more with swaddling cloths. And then, a much-yearned-for-voice sounds forth from the cloud saying: "This is my beloved Son, my Chosen, listen to him!" (Mark 9:7) And I can't help but imagine what Jesus was thinking, then: "Bury it with me. I want to take this voice with me as far as I can go..."

My friends...Jesus calls us from the mountain top back into the plain (Mark 9:9). For this is most fully where the "gravity of God's grace" calls us. Not with the big thick things of this world: the heavy stuff of gold medals...of Olympics...and glory...but rather into the *thin* places – to be his church, the people of *thin* little grains of salt, of leaven, of light. Are we listening!

Come February 17 we will begin to journey the *thin* road less traveled (ala Robert Frost) with Jesus – into the shadowlands of Lent. *Thin* people are we...like ashes that all fall down. But in the midst of it all comes a word that transfigures us with deep and abiding joy. A *Gummy Box* Word together with the bread and the wine coming into our shaking hands, and says, "Be My Valentine. Cross My Heart..."

Let us pray:

How good, Lord, to be here!
Yet we may not remain.
For since you bid us leave the mount;
Come with us, please...
Come with us to the plain. Amen


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Capital Campaign Update

More than 800 men, women, and children in Sioux Falls are without a home. Union Gospel Mission

Union Gospel Mission has been working in Sioux Falls since 1900 to provide spiritual nourishment, housing, meals, clothing and household items to needy folks in our community.



Lodging for up to 70 men and 48 women and children is available for individuals who find themselves without shelter and needing a place to rest and get out of the elements. Bishop Dudley Hospitality House

Bishop Dudley Hospitality House is an ecumenical ministry in Sioux Falls that provides a central, first stop resource for those in crisis. The

Bishop Dudley House offers daytime and overnight emergency shelter for the homeless



and vulnerable, housing some 80 men, 20 women, and 7 families nightly at the House. Like Union Gospel Mission, their programming also serves the whole needs of the person. To learn more about this ministry, as well as explore volunteer duties and donation options, visit bdhh.org.

St. Francis House

St. Francis House is an emergency and transitional housing program for up to 120 men and women, and 7 families whose mission is to move people from homelessness to hope. SFH's programming requires guests to obtain and maintain employment; place 50 percent of



every paycheck into a savings account; remain alcohol, substance and gambling free; uphold household chores; and attend two self-improvement classes each week. SFH provides guests with shelter, food, debt management, basic essentials, case management, and HOPE! Visit stfrancishouse. com to learn more.

The Banquet

The Banquet aims to equip volunteers as they provide food and fellowship to the many community members served through this ministry. By hosting meals at their facility, The Banquet provides a safe place where people can gather, receive nourishment,


