Art Pressed into the Service of Christ's Church

At all worship services on the weekend of February 13-14, our family of First Lutheran Church celebrated the unveiling of one set of our beautiful new paraments and processional banners. The services also included a brief litany of consecration.

Some of you might still be wondering: "What are paraments?" Simply stated: paraments are the liturgical hangings on and around the altar, as well as the colored cloths that hang from the pulpit and lectern, including the ecclesiastical vestments/stoles worn by the pastors. Their various colors reflect the different Seasons of the Church Year.

It was quite serendipitous that the Gospel text assigned for that particular weekend was from Mark 9:2-9, referred to in our Christian tradition as "Transfiguration Sunday." That is, according to St. Mark's account, Jesus is transfigured on a mountain top as "his garments became glistening, intensely white, as no fuller on earth could bleach them" (Mark 9:3; RSV). This stunning imagery reflects the glory of God that is to be found in Jesus, "the beloved Son," to whom God calls Jesus' disciples and us to listen (Mark 9:7). And so it is, that the paraments and processional banner for Transfiguration Sunday are white in color. You may have noticed that on the following Sunday, as we've now moved into the Season of Lent, the paraments changed to the color purple-reflecting a spirit of contrition or repentance.

The world-class artisan work that has been sewn into these beautiful paraments is sign and symbol of the Church Year that keeps our Christian walk focused on the life and ministry of Jesus. Most of us were not around when the plate glass windows of First Lutheran's sanctuary were transformed by the present-day stained glass, which must have been amazing to behold. However, we are the blessed beneficiaries of our forebears' vision for ways in which to press art into the service of and glory to God in our life of worship. May it be so also among us, as we perhaps might hear—if we listen closely—to the stained glass windows applauding these new artisan partners, that also serve to lift our spirits in prayer, praise, and thanksgiving.

The Parament Story

The story of our new paraments began in a Worship and Music Board meeting in February 2018. The idea being discussed was whether First Lutheran should consider commissioning a new set of white paraments for the 100th Anniversary celebration coming up in two years. The beloved Hardanger white set was starting to show its age, with fraying and yellowing at the neckline of the stoles as well as snags, holes, and stains on the other pieces.

The Board formed a committee to investigate and make recommendations. This committee included Diane Atchison, Cathy Christopherson, Marilyn Van Demark, Shirley

Barlow, and Cami Jacobsen. After looking over the white set and taking into consideration their historical value to the congregation, the committee recommended that we restore this beautiful, significant set. This meant we needed to disassemble, repair, clean, and reconstruct each piece. Restoration work began in the spring and continued into the summer and early fall. These were reintroduced back into use in October 2018. It soon became apparent that the careful restoration was not completely successful. The fabric of the paraments was simply breaking down thanks to their constant use over the decades.

In early 2019, the Board decided to again explore commissioning a special parament set for the 100th Anniversary. We decided to make the design timeless instead of specific to the anniversary.

After much consideration, we decided that Ecclesiastical Sewing in Baxter, Minnesota, had the talent, skill, and technical resources to create paraments that met the unique needs of our sanctuary.

During this time, the parament committee also looked over the condition of other parts of the chancel, including the needlepoint kneelers, chairs, and benches. We repaired and restored many of these historical pieces in our chancel.

After an inventory of all the banners and paraments

When COVID hit in March 2020, everything came to a stop. The shutting down of businesses temporarily slowed down Ecclesiastical Sewing's ability to order and receive some of the fabrics and threads necessary to create the various banners and seasonal paraments. Eventually, they procured all the needed materials.

Throughout the spring, summer, and fall of last year, each piece of our collection was lovingly and skillfully stitched. Slowly and carefully, the artisans made each of the paraments, and the collection started to come together.

Because we wanted to be surprised, Ecclesiastical Sewing did not send pictures of the pieces as they were being made or when they were finished. Even though they have many gorgeous photos of their work online, they were careful to not include our paraments in these photos, lest the surprise be spoiled.

Meanwhile, down in our church's woodshop, our carpenters were hard at work building sturdy wooden racks to hold every piece of the parament collection in a way that would keep them safe and preserve them through the years. They soon skillfully completed the task of building nine racks that would soon hold the new paraments. We owe them a debt of gratitude for the many hours they put into building.

Finally, on sunny January 13, the paraments arrived at our church. Many members of the church staff, the Board of Worship and Music, and the parament committee all came to unwrap and receive the finished product. It can easily be said these paraments awed each person who saw them that day.

"God's Word is present, not only when one speaks and understands [though this is certainly at the heart of our Lutheran Confessions]. For God's Word is also present when something in God's creation [participates in, but also points beyond itself, to God's glory] in effective symbols. Verbum [Word] is more than oratio [speech]. And sadly, Protestantism has forgotten that to a great degree. Verbum, as word of revelation can be in everything in which the Spirit of God expresses itself, even in the silent symbols of art." j.r. christopherson Senior Pastor used during worship throughout the church year, it was concluded that all the paraments needed replacing. Thanks to decades of use, many of the current paraments were faded, fraying, and unable to be restored. The former paraments that are still in good condition will be converted to use in the chapel.

Work soon began on the design of this new collection. The collection includes a set for each of the church seasons—blue for Advent; purple for Lent; green for the time after Epiphany and Pentecost; red for Reformation and Pentecost; and white for Christmas, Easter, Epiphany and other festivals and commemorations. The pastors spent numerous hours meeting with us, and after much thoughtful discussion, liturgical symbols were carefully chosen for each piece of the paraments. After many revisions, these liturgical designs were finally ready. Ecclesiastical Sewing breathed life into the beautiful designs and symbols we see today.

After years of planning and council approval, the sewing began in earnest in late 2020. Ecclesiastical Sewing began to order the components, fabrics, threads, etc. that were needed to start production.



The pastors introduced and dedicated the white set to our congregation on Transfiguration Sunday, February 14. Future First Word articles will provide more of the details, symbolism, and history behind each piece. We hope and pray that First Lutheran Church will enjoy and cherish these paraments for decades to come.

Joyful, Generous Giving

"The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and selfcontrol. There is no law against such things." Galatians 5:22-23

Measuring generosity is like stealing a toy from a baby—it's just not right. Generosity isn't meant to be

weighed and counted, but rather we know it is a gift of the Spirit. It's a fruit of faith, something that grows naturally, organically like branches connected to the vine, Jesus Christ. And yet, there is a deep desire for people to keep track of how their giving to their congregation is being used for the missions and ministries that we have pledged to support with prayer and resources.

Offering Last year was a difficult 64.4% year in many respects, but the generous financial gifts through the people of First Lutheran kept the congregation in a very good position. At a couple points, there was real fear that we would have to make cuts to be financially responsible, but those fears never became reality. In addition, as we began to plan ministry for 2021, there was worry that our pledged income would take a hit, but again it didn't! The faithful generosity of so many across our

congregation was clearly evident through one of the most uncertain times of our lives.

So, we can take a couple minutes to examine the generosity that has been shown with confidence that this fruit has been grown through faith, not under compulsion and not with a hint of fear mongering. Instead, take a look at the charts below, and notice the percentage of our total giving that went to things beyond normal operating. These are gifts that are beyond our yearly budget-that faithful, generous

people gave specifically to ministries that they want to see thrive.

Extra Designated Giving 30.6% Foundation Gifts 5%

Get this-the total extra giving this year was \$750,471.75. That is amazing! And it doesn't include gifts to the FLC Foundation of another \$121,207.09. My point is simply this: 35.6% of the gifts received were given beyond the yearly operating budget. That amazing number is an incredible testament to the faithful generosity of the people of God. There is no accurate

way to measure generosity as it is a matter of faith and the heart, but it is important to tell the story of how the Holy Spirit is bearing fruit among us.

Thanks be to God for the joy of giving!

For our devotions today I will read from Paul's letter to the Roman's, chapter 8, verses 38 and 39.

"And I am convinced that nothing can separate us from



Thank you for your participation and having a heart like Jesus, serving others.


never heard of it, but now I can find any music I desire by simply typing it in. Unbelievable! "The Eddie Duchin Story" original movie soundtrack was a favorite



Capital Campaign Update

Another \$20,103 has been paid on the HVAC loan, bringing our remaining debt to \$444,055. This is good news!

A beginning date for the campaign to start visits again has not yet been determined. As the conversations take place about the renewing of campaign visits, you will be notified via First Word and the website to that start date.

I thought this month would be a good time to remind the congregation of some projects that are still outstanding on the capital campaign. This month I am highlighting the needs in the Sanctuary and Christ the Victor Chapel. Next month, I will highlight the Atrium and Welcome Center as well as the building maintenance.

Sanctuary Improvements—\$1,415,000

Sound system—The entire current sound systems (\$250,000) need to be replaced in the Sanctuary and Chapel. Our speakers and controls are outdated and obsolete. Due to dead spots inside the Sanctuary, sound echoes and is not heard evenly.

Sanctuary ceiling—The Sanctuary ceiling (\$650,000) needs to be replaced. The current ceiling tiles are degrading due to age and condensation between the ceiling and roof. This is a concern for safety, and it **affects the Sanctuary sound quality**.

Sanctuary wall repair—The Sanctuary walls (\$265,000) are cracking, and though some interior wall repairs have been done every few years, a longer-lasting repair is suggested. Artistic painting (\$250,000) is also included in the capital campaign.





EVANGELISM AND OUTREACH MINISTRY

Go, therefore, and make disciples...

Over the last few years, the emphasis of the Evangelism & Outreach Board has been to move from primarily a financial partnership entity of First Lutheran Church to more of an engagement and involvement focus.

Nearly six years ago, the strategic initiatives that were laid out in

the First and Foremost process as the congregational voice were to move in a direction of engagement and involvement. It has taken time to put some of those things in place, but looking back, I can appreciate where we are today versus then.

In the Evangelism & Outreach area, we took to task developing programmatic ministry that is congregation driven. The four areas identified are:

- Own the downtown
- Invest time and resources in specific downtown needs
- Outreach at First Lutheran
- Seeking the lost

We have looked to evaluate and re-purpose our intentions based on what we have seen come about over the last year especially. It shouldn't surprise you that looking back on 2020 gives us a picture that is entirely different...or is it?

Every ministry area had to take a good, hard look last year as to how to continue to function knowing that in-person attendance was not possible for the most part,

or at least extremely limited. As a staff, we were challenged to make things as accessible as we could while maintaining a quality of work that exemplifies what FLC is known for.

Some things worked, and some are still quite challenging. I would say that the ministry partnerships we have formed in recent years showed the strength of FLC's collaborative during the early stages of the pandemic. We shifted a little to partner with CoronaHelp Sioux Falls (85 congregations from Sioux Falls) to bring a collaborative single-stream approach to these ministry needs, and I would say it went marvelously. It showed the strength of our working together rather than in silos. I am convinced this would not have happened before First and Foremost.

As I have said before, our partnership with Lowell Elementary is a thriving partnership in many ways. With the involvement of many volunteers, we have established a strong presence in the Lowell community. Again, this school year has looked different. We have not been able to be so "hands-on," so we have looked for creative ways to stay engaged there. This year, we as a congregation sponsored classrooms so teachers were supported in many ways. This included the music teachers as well. I have been told MANY times the impact this has made on staff and in allowing children to have experiences in ways they did not previously see.

These are just a couple highlights. The reality is, we have built some amazing opportunities from the First and Foremost planning process, and there is still much work to do. But even more, we are called to spread the good news of Jesus Christ, and we are building relationships that allow us to do that. Each of us has a responsibility to that. It is not just the job of a pastor or the staff. Each of us has been called through the great commission (Matthew 28:19), which is to go out into the world and make disciples, baptizing them in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.
