

"Go therefore and make disciples..."

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." Matthew 28:19-20

As we worship the good news of Christ's death and resurrection throughout this season of Easter, the church is charged with carrying out the great commission that Jesus Christ tells his disciples before his ascension. The true function of the church is to tell all people the gospel of Jesus Christ, proclaim the forgiveness of sins, and speak the promises of salvation. That is the "why" we do what we do; the better question in these days especially is how do we do it?

Well, that is a great question. It is well known that we (the FLC congregation) gather on Sundays nearly every week (pre-COVID) to worship God with prayer, praise, and thanksgiving. But it is also no great surprise to state that church attendance has declined—in all churches—not just here at FLC. A recent Gallup poll showed that for the first time in United States history, the minority of the population now belongs to a church—just 47%. For the first time in our history, younger people do not worship like their parents did/do. Attending worship is no longer a matter of birth rite, meaning children born to Lutheran parents may not worship in a Lutheran context, if they attend worship at all, as adults. We can no longer operate in the "if you build it, they will come" mindset. Many people no longer consider matters of faith a core to their beliefs and values. Young people no longer see being part of a church community as important as their parents, and especially their grandparents, do. There are many reasons for this, but unfortunately, declining numbers are a significant symptom of our culture.

"Do we play the defeatist card ... Or do we do something about it?"

The question is: Do we play the defeatist card and say, "Oh well, we gave it our best shot, but that is just the way it is!" Or do we do something about it?

One of the factors that has crippled church attendance and growth is how we communicate, especially in matters of faith. "It is hard to talk to strangers about faith and church," is a comment I hear often.

But why is that? Again, there are many factors.

The first and hardest step in this process is the relational component. It takes opening yourself to talking with other people in order to create a relationship that allows for more open conversation. It is also about invitationasking people to join you in attending worship or something you enjoy here at FLC. If people find a sense of community here, involvement in worship and other opportunities will follow.

One critical factor that is a challenging part of our culture here at FLC is that we do not open ourselves to inviting and accommodating others easily. We think we do, we say we do, but really think about that. My question to that is: How do we expect things to change if we keep doing the very same thing and expecting different results?

During the season of Lent, I tried an experiment along with nine random guys from our congregation. We called it "Garage Guys." We met each of the five weeks in Lent for an hour or so on Thursday evenings. The intent was to get to know each other better. We spoke about our livesgrowing up, education, our families, our jobs, what we like to do when we are not working, and...what faith looked like in our lives. We also had a theme to ponder each week accompanied by a few Bible verses.

I will admit, at first, it was a little uncomfortable. But I found that each week, it became easier, and I found a new bond with this "band of brothers." What I think made a difference was that each guy was personally invited into the conversation and we agreed to be intentionally vulnerable with each other.

The pastoral and director staff have focused for some time on making conversations about faith easier. A few years ago, we began using the FAITH5° concept to help make conversations easier in matters of faith.

A life of discipleship is centered on your confession of faith, telling others what you believe and why it is important to you. Only talking about church or your faith life with those you know and see often is like singing to the choir. We may have appreciation for it, but it isn't gaining anything.

When asked how YOU are making PRAY disciples, you cannot respond, "Well, for one another's that is somebody else's job!" God highs and lows promises that when His Word goes out from your mouth, it does not **OBLESS** return empty (Isaiah 55:11). Oper one another your mouth, invite others to come www.faith5.org and experience this place. Make space for others in things you are involved. Grant permission to yourself and to others to be intentionally vulnerable. It is amazing to watch what the Holy Spirit will do.

Council Votes to Resume Capital Campaign

On March 25, the Church Council voted to resume the capital campaign. We will begin building teams to visit again as well as developing meetings at church. Watch for more information.

The HVAC loan remaining balance is now \$390,273. To clarify some information about the financial portion

of the campaign; a portion of that amount was gifted to the church by the FLC Foundation. The Foundation gave First Lutheran a gift of \$500,000 in celebration of the 100th anniversary. Of that \$500,000, there was an amount of \$205,691 that the Church Council voted to apply to the HVAC loan. It is with gratitude that we thank the Foundation for this wonderful gift to the church.

Remaining aspects of the capital campaign he Building Maintenance and Reserve Funds: \$675,000 Building Maintenance is considered each year in the annual budget. There are, however, projects that come up periodically, like resurfacing the parking lot, that take place as needed. The same can be said about the windows, tuck pointing, and brick repair. The Reserve Fund is intended to cover planned, required maintenance that is above the yearly budget items. The Reserve Fund will allow the flexibility to manage these projects with the money already raised.

Do you talk about things that are happening here at FLC with people who do not attend here? How do you communicate matters of faith with those around you? Have you ever talked to a stranger about Jesus Christ? These are all good questions for you to ponder. But pondering it is not enough...

The future of the church depends on it!

The campaign would support the 10% but would not exceed \$500,000. The Evangelism, Mission, and Outreach Board will advise the Church Council on distribution and amounts.

May Special Offering: Pine Ridge Retreat Center

One of the South Dakota Synod's Multicultural Ministries that First Lutheran also supports is the Pine Ridge Retreat Center, a Lutheran Lakota shared ministry located in Pine Ridge, South Dakota. According to the Synod website, the mission of this ministry is "to foster better understanding between Indian and non-Indian peoples and to make contributions to the life of the people living on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation" by offering crosscultural retreats.

The Pine Ridge Retreat Center allows visitors to come and stay while immersing themselves in the culture, heritage, and daily life of the Pine Ridge community. Opportunities to participate in outreach programs include service projects like the sandwich program, community service events such as Kids Against Hunger distributions, daily worship, educational and cultural learning experiences, youth ministry, and construction projects while allowing guests to interact with and learn more about the Lakota people.

Built in 2000, the Retreat Center facility accommodates up to 15 guests and provides all the comforts and amenities necessary for a memorable stay. Unfortunately, given the pandemic and current visitation restrictions, these experiences will not be available until it is deemed safe. In the meantime, the Retreat Center continues to serve and support the community. The Center is staffed, and much work



is going on behind the scenes with members of the Lakota Job Corps building a new Kid's Time area that will welcome children when it is safe for them to return. In addition, the Center currently provides snacks and activities to the children who are part of Kid's Time as well as meals twice a month for their families. Sandwiches and diapers are also available from the Retreat Center.

Many are looking forward to the opportunity to again gather safely and visit the Retreat Center, but in the meantime, please consider making a gift to support the Pine Ridge Retreat Center by using one of the special offering envelopes provided by the church or by writing "Pine Ridge Retreat Center" on the memo line of your check made out to First Lutheran Church. And NO, you do not need to know how to sew or even be able to thread a needle. The only qualifications are being able to distinguish the sharp end of a pin, and you are not allowed to run with scissors.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 80 percent of Americans don't get enough regular exercise.

First Lutheran's Stepping into Health program, sponsored by the Care and Health Ministry, has a plan for those interested in health and longevity who don't want to be counted in that 80 percent. Please join the next session of Stepping into Health, June 1 through August 31. Cycling is also acceptable.

It is a motivating factor when one is accountable for their exercise program by reporting total steps walked or run or miles biked at the end of each month.

So many steps go into the making of a quilt, such as sorting fabric, preparing sheets that will be used for the bottom layer, and cutting and measuring the batting that is used for the center layer. The top layer is the most time-consuming and uses the fabric that has been pressed and cut into usable sized pieces to be sewn together to make a top 60 by 80 inches.

These are just a few of the things that contribute to the making of a quilt. So, as you can see, there is something for everyone to do no matter your skill level. You can HELP! But, the very best part is the lifelong friends made, the prayers, laughter, tears, joys, etc. The rewards are endless, and the coffee is quite good! (That is if Carolyn makes it!)
