Dear Members and Friends of First Lutheran Church:

With gratitude and fondness for our shared ministry, I announce my resignation as Associate Pastor of Caring Ministry at First Lutheran Church. I resign for reasons of family: As many of you know, my children are enrolled in the Sioux Falls School District Virtual Academy (remaining there until the COVID-19 situation stabilizes further), and it's been tough to balance my duties at church while also guiding them in their schoolwork. Additionally, Pastor Lars and I will soon be formally approved for foster parenting in the state of South Dakota! We are excited for this development but expect that the needs of our family will become even greater as we engage this special calling. I plan to take time off from work until perhaps the fall of 2021, and during this time, I will discern what my next professional role will be.

I have spoken with the Bishop's office, my fellow First Lutheran pastors, and council president about my resignation. We agree that my last Sunday in the pulpit will be on November 8, with the final day of ministry being set for November 14. Some important conversations will occur about the future of the Care and Health Ministry at First Lutheran Church, as well as the pastoral staff, and we trust God to guide that process through.

I do intend to remain part of First Lutheran Church as a member and as the spouse of a pastor. I intend to be a supportive presence in the congregation while allowing space for new leadership to emerge.

I praise God for the many ways our lives have intersected in these past six years of my pastoral call to First Lutheran



Church and remain grateful that this community will continue to be a cherished part of my life.

Thanksgiving to Go!



Come and Worship: Living Our Liturgy in Hope & Thanksgiving

"Now Moses was keeping the flock of his father-inlaw, Jethro, the priest of Midian; and he led his flock to the west side of the wilderness, and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. And the angel of the LORD appeared to him in a flame of fire out of the midst of a bush; and he looked, and lo, the bush was

burning, yet it was not consumed. ... [And] God called to him out of the bush, 'Moses, Moses!' And he said, 'Here am I.' Then [God] said, 'Do not come near; put off your shoes from your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground.' And he said, 'I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob." (Exodus 3:1-6; RSV)

Do you see or hear anything in this marvelous passage from the Old Testament that connects us with the beginning of the New Testament? Something that will soon touch our lives anew with a spirit of hope and thanksgiving in the coming months? Something that will find fulsome chorus of a well-beloved congregational hymn, "Come and worship, come and worship ... worship Christ the newborn king" (Angels from the Realms of Glory)?

I'd like for you to ponder with me God's salvation history here, with its beginnings in the OT books of Genesis and Exodus, that keeps time through the centuries of Israel's people and prophets, and then reaches a climactic fulfillment (Galatians 4:4) in a second exodus. It's a second exodus that also begins with a proclamation of an angel (Luke 2:9) ... with beholding shepherds and the unfolding of swaddling cloths (Luke 2:12). But rather than a bright heavenly light breaking down through a dark starry night, for Moses it was one that ignited a fiery bush, in broad daylight: of "sparks that flew up" (Job 5:7) ...

breaking open the eyes of Moses and us as well. Family of First Lutheran, do we not also feel like Moses and the shepherds of Bethlehem generations later, those tending our fears under a dark night of the COVID-19 pandemic? The stars are still

> brightly shining, but do we simply shutter in fear? Or ... do we break-out with confident expressions of thanksgiving, "gathering together" to worship—where we can hear God's Word of reassurance and

hope for us and receive God's Sacraments of forgiveness and new life? Hear the Psalmist belting it out with joy: "I was glad when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of the LORD [to worship]" (Psalm 122:1; RSV).

Indeed, the Bible is replete with the assurance that God is everywhere present (I Kings 8:27; II Chronicles 2:6; 6:8; Psalm 15:3; 24:1; 139:7-10; Isaiah 43:2; Job 34:21; Jeremiah 23:22-24; Acts 17:27-28; Matthew 28:20; I Corinthians 3:16). Thus, the whole earth is holy because God makes himself known in it, which means that in and

trusting in God's grace, and living in the peace that results. "Thanks" isn't always the first thing on our mind, but there are so many reasons to give thanks to the people of First Lutheran. In financial terms, this has been a challenging year. However, in the challenge, we still give thanks for your hope-filled giving to support the ministries we share.

In addition, "Thank You!" to everyone who has returned a pledge for 2021 and to those who will return one soon. Pledges of any amount should be returned no later than Sunday, November 15, which will help us greatly to plan our ministry budget for the coming year. You can easily make a pledge online at flcsf.org/pledge, call the church office, or stop in to fill out a pledge card. These commitments allow us to confidently plan for next year's ministry budgets. At the same time, they help you remember to support your congregation and that you are a part of each ministry!

Here are some further considerations about stewardship and giving at the end of the year:

"Bunching" or Double Pledge

The changes in the IRS codes have caused some rethinking of charitable giving. It is possible to give a double gift by "bunching" your pledge offering for two years in order to take advantage of tax deductions. Your gift will be distributed monthly to the church.

Stocks, IRA, Mutual Funds

IRA, stocks, and mutual funds are also giving options. These transactions must be completed by December 11, 2020, to guarantee they are received by year-end.

Year End Giving

All gifts/donations must be received in the church office or postmarked by Thursday, December 31, 2020, in order to be counted for the 2020 tax year.

Capital Campaign

While the fundraising portion of the Capital Campaign is on hold for now, gifts toward the HVAC loan and other projects are still welcome. Capital Campaign giving is always "extra mile" or "beyond regular" giving. Regular offerings fund the annual budget and support ongoing ministries while Capital Campaign funds are designated for one-time projects beyond the church's budget.

Luther House of Study Challenge

First Lutheran is completing the third year of a five-year commitment to support Luther House of Study with special gifts of \$50,000 per year. Thank you to everyone who has contributed! Luther House provides great teaching for our



seminary students as well as for any who would like to learn more indepth Lutheran theology. Learn more at lutherhouseofstudy.org.

From now through the end of the year, a matching challenge has been offered. Gifts will be matched to \$10,000 to start the funding for next year's commitment. Thank you!

Board Nominations

Board and Council members are elected every year at the Annual Congregational Meeting, held on a Sunday at the end of January. The nomination process, however, begins in October and November by exploring which seats will be open, what boards need for the coming year, and gathering names of possible interested members of First Lutheran Church.

Boards typically meet monthly for about one hour. Each board has a different ministry focus and yearly plan, but each board oversees a budget and program, and carries out ministry throughout the year. of itself the church is no holier than any place else. BUT ... what makes a church who gathers for worship holy in a special way is that God's Spirit "calls, gathers, and enlightens" us in a way that we are more "here" ... in worship ... than out "there," in the wooly wiles of the world. As an avid fan of skiing in the snow-capped Rocky Mountains and fly-fishing (which I hope to get back to someday), I must admit there's a lot to be said for the common refrain: "Oh, I just feel so close to God when I'm outdoors." However, as amazing as the power and the majesty of God's creation certainly is, not even the whispering pine or the babbling brook can "tell" you that God cares or is really present for you.



By this I mean we come to worship, "Just as I am" more fully and nakedly ourselves, with more of our humanness showing than we are apt to in other places. We come like Moses with sheepdip on our shoes—footsore and travel-stained with the dust of our lives ... of failures, deceits, and hypocrisy. As we confess in our liturgy: "We are captive to sin and cannot free ourselves." Like Moses, we come as those who feel exiled from what is truly home. We know it in our hearts that something is missing that we just can't really name—something we've somehow lost or ... must admit, are lost ourselves—coming to worship to find it or better yet, to be found. We come to worship in order to acknowledge that in terms of the very best we can be, we're lost and helpless to save ourselves. We're a people who live "east of Eden" (J. Steinbeck), who sense a "paradise lost" (J. Milton), searching for a place, a home, where our names are known, "where we're always welcomed in." It's a sense of "something we somehow haven't to deserve": (R. Frost) that's called grace. Listen again for these saving, healing words for you at the beginning of each worship service: "In the mercy of almighty God, Jesus Christ was given to die for [you], and for his sake God forgives [you] all [your] sins.

This is the sadness and the search of what a church is, of who we honestly are as we come to worship—and then suddenly FIRE! The bush bursts into flame, which is us! And a voice says

with a splashing of water that creates a holy smoke: "Bob. Bob! ... Betty. Betty! You. You! You are my beloved child 'sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever." Now GO! CLAIM this word and PROCLAIM it. Make Disciples! Yes, go in peace and serve the Lord ... in the needs of the neighbor. "And know that I am with you always, to the close of the age," promises Jesus (Matthew 28:20).

A few weeks ago, as I was privileged to spend time with Joan Hansen and two of her daughters, as they shared stories of their beloved husband and father, Frank Hansen, the younger daughter, Carolyn, observed: "Growing up our family lived in a *house* on South Holly, but we always knew our *home* was on South Dakota Avenue." My friends, when we're in worship at 327 South Dakota Avenue, know that we're on sacred ground. Because we hear God's voice here. A voice who has known our name from all eternity (Ps. 139:1-18; Isa. 43:1-3).

There are of course many reasons why people come to church, to worship: the news in the *New* York Times is more and more "gloom and doom," or perhaps come out of habit or tradition, or to be entertained; sometimes beatified, sometimes bored. But the deepest reason for being at worship, I believe, is that people come to hear a word of HOPE. One that comes like a light that breaks the darkness (Luke 2:8-14; John 1:4-5), or brings a fiery awakening on earth (Exodus 3). We come to worship to have our lives wedded, to be baptized, or commended into our Heavenly Father's "tender bosom gather." "Into your hands, O merciful Savior, we commend your servant Place your name here. Acknowledge we humbly beseech you, a sheep of your own fold, a lamb of your own flock, a child, a sinner of your own redeeming. Receive him/her into the arms of your mercy, and into the blessed rest of everlasting peace, and into the glorious company of the saints in light."

Yes, we come to worship so our hollow lives would somehow be hallowed. That with all the evidence to the contrary in our world of incivility, racism, wars, and the COVID-19 pandemic, the ground we stand on in worship is holy ground. Why? Because Christ still walks here and touches us with his body and blood in a holy communion. As Luther would remind us, we are Christ's "communion of saints" who gather around his Word and Sacrament, where he promises to be present, really present, right down to the flesh and bone of it all: "This is my body, given for you." ... Some 18 centuries since Moses experienced God's voice through the burning bush at Mt. Horeb, the American poet, Elizabeth Barrett Browning

"Earth is crammed with heaven And every common bush aflame with God's presence But only [those] who see take off [their] shoes The rest sit around and pick blackberries."

The First Lutheran Church Women are disappointed to announce that the 2020 Bazaar has been cancelled. Everyone will miss this wonderful tradition, but this decision was made in the interest of keeping our volunteers and attendees safe and healthy. In 2019, the First Lutheran Church Women were able to distribute \$49,620 to local and global missions and charities. We are saddened to think we will not be able to fund these missions to such an extent again this year. However, we would like to support as many ministries and missions as we can during these challenging times.

As you can see from the pictures of our "rummage saleswomen," we are not idle. We have held three rummage sales earning \$7,950.39, plus mission donations of \$1,716.00 which enabled us to deposit \$9,666.36 into the Bazaar account. It was over 61 years ago that teacher "Jerry" gave me this precious little porcelain bible with a verse. I was nine years old and Jerry was my Sunday School teacher at First

Lutheran. From that point on, I discovered this scripture to be relevant every step of the way.



There have been many missteps, but this little gift from teacher Jerry has always been with me and is one of my most prized possessions. It is as though the words had been etched on my heart.

Now I wish I could tell you who 'Teacher Jerry' was and his surname, but I only have fond memories of a really kind man who was instrumental in searing both in my mind and heart that I was an eternal being.

I have now had the privilege of being on the visitation pastoral staff for nearly 6 years at First Lutheran. I love this ministry with all my heart! And with this privilege has come the pain of having to say goodbye to several men and women that have become very dear friends of mine as they pass on to eternity. In WWII, the Allied forces had to come up with quick fixes to help turn the tide when parts were scarce and equipment broke down.

4) Togetherness despite limitations.

Had anybody truly ever heard of the "Zoom" app prior to the pandemic? Together with FaceTime and Skype, this technology allows us to be together despite being apart.

5) Greater appreciation for teachers and home-schooling parents.

Enough said!

6) Renewed interest in reading and writing.

We definitely have more time in our day. We now find we can while away our time channel surfing mindlessly, or delve into a good book that we have been meaning to read for years, either online or in traditional form. And journaling has reached new heights during this time of aloneness. For me, this is my second article for First Word in as many months. I have been a member here for 40+ years. Pre-pandemic articles=0.

7) Increase in cooking at home and family meals.

Family togetherness is something that our society has placed on the back burner for many years because everyone, including the dog, is so busy! Mealtime is a great time to reconnect as a family for conversation and being together.

8) Spiritual innovation.

Virtual church services have been a true blessing. Consider a week without the Word in your life, and one quickly recognizes the value in participating even remotely in the confession and absolution, hearing the Word preached, the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, prayers of the church, the hymns, and the benediction. If this would happen for week after week, the chances for entering a spiritual wilderness would be very real.

9) Return to reading the Bible and prayer.

It is easy to fall into bad habits. But, with more time available, we also have more time to develop a habit of Bible reading and prayer.

A right perspective of ourselves (powerlessness of self and reliance on God).

Who are we kidding? God, the creator of the universe, is always in charge. We may deceive ourselves into believing we are important, but the reality is we are mere specks in the cosmos, and God is awesome!

So, in contradistinction to a retired comedian's top ten list, I would submit that this list may have value lasting well beyond the current pandemic. And once again, God has taken something we consider to be very bad and helps us return to Him. What a blessing!

Meet Cantor, Michelle Davis

In the last few months, many in the congregation have asked: "Who was the cantor this weekend?" Our cantors play a crucial role in leading worship, never more so than since we began virtual worship in March 2020. The Music and Worship ministry thought it would be fun for First Word readers to meet our cantors over the next few months.

When did you join First Lutheran Church?

I joined First Lutheran when baptized in 1967.

Provide a brief bio of your family and musical background. I have two adult children, Gillian (22) and Karsten (19). They both live and work in Sioux Falls. My husband, Steven, is a Major in the Army Reserve currently serving at Fort McCoy, Wisconsin. When not serving, he is a Certified Nurse Practitioner. I have been fortunate to work at the REALTOR® Association of the Sioux Empire, Inc. for 18+ years and am the Director of Education & Dispute Resolutions. I grew up in a musical family; my folks met singing in a show together in early 1962. I started singing in Carol Choir under Bonnie Lindgren's direction and haven't stopped singing since!

How long have you served as a cantor at First Lutheran? Why did you get involved in this ministry? I'm not sure when I began volunteering to cantor; it may have been around 2002 when my son, Karsten, was a baby. I am a true believer in giving back with the talents that God has gifted you with and that is why, even though my vocal pipes are more rusty than when I first started, I still cantor today.

What do you enjoy most about leading worship in this capacity? I enjoy singing and being able to share the music with the congregation. I pray that I help bring some meaning to their worship experience through God's words in the music.

What hymn or part of the liturgy do you enjoy singing most? Why? I've come to enjoy singing the Psalm. At first it was not my favorite and I would have chosen the "Kyrie." I enjoy the vocal challenge the Psalms sometimes provide.



How has this time of serving as the primary leader of the church's song impacted/challenged you as a musician and **Christian?** When first asked to cantor, I must admit my nerves made it somewhat difficult to hold the hymnal while canting due to my hands shaking so badly. I am glad for that experience and the opportunity to be a part of leading worship through music. My nerves are still with me every time I cantor; however, they're not so bad that I must keep my trembling hands at my side. Being involved in the worship service in this capacity has strengthened my Christian beliefs. I've become more confident in canting, but I still get nervous and remind myself that no one is perfect; mistakes may be made, but the only ones who know are me and Zachary!

Any other stories you'd like to share about your work as a cantor and musician at First Lutheran? We are so fortunate to have the strong music program we do at FLC. As a lifelong member, it saddens me to see our numbers dwindling in all the choirs. I encourage congregation members young and older, who have a love for singing, to share your talents and consider joining us when we are able to once again come together to practice and sing beautiful music to God. Singing fills a place in your soul unlike any other, for "As long as we live, there is never enough singing," Martin Luther.





Vecinos Unidos (VU), formerly Ayuda, translated as "Neighbors United," is a closely related initiative and is a partnership supported by the ELCA congregations of Sioux Falls. The VU group helps to establish relationships between the people of Pueblo de Dios and the other predominantly Anglo-Lutheran churches in Sioux Falls.

In addition to selling tamales, volunteers are encouraged to help with the Logos program at Pueblo, which is their version of church school (like our Scripture First) on Wednesday nights. They also have a language partners program where an English-speaking person is paired with a Spanish-speaking person, and they learn each other's language. If you have always wanted to learn Spanish, seek to help in this amazing ministry.

VU also looks to provide pathways for people seeking asylum and helps the recently emigrated find pathways to establish a life here in Sioux Falls.
