

order to buy some "fireworks" from hell). And this is what became the "final straw" for Luther, one that broke the very back of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. For the sale of these fireworks (a.k.a. indulgences)-with its jingle that "As soon as the coin in the coffer rings/The soul from purgatory springs"—was sign and symbol of a heavy-handed, bureaucratic religious system that had finally gone off-the-tracks. It touched the one doctrine about which Luther was hyper-sensitive; that is, that we are "justified by God's grace" apart from any works of the law for the forgiveness of sins (Romans 6:23; Ephesians 2:4-9). At the heart of the matter were people being duped into believing that a purchase of indulgences meant they could "buy/pay off God" for their sins.

(which set the Reformation into full locomotion) was not necessarily extreme...as these theological propositions/questions were intended for scholarly debate...the recent invention of the Gutenberg printing press (c. 1440) made possible their swift circulation, far and wide. And so the battle for reform-"in head and members"-began. Come Reformation Sunday, October 31, take a tour on our "Luther's Road to the Reformation" that will be on display with posterboard art and free commentary booklets (designed by Dale Jahr; text by Pr. John Christopherson)—beginning at the south end of the Main Atrium and leading into Reformation Hall. It's a Scripture First, educational experience for all ages.

- Pr. Lars gave staffing updates: Brett Miller (Y&F Coordinator) resigned unexpectedly and abruptly, so we're searching for a new candidate. Skylar Schwab started earlier this month as the new Youth Minister. Matt Tylutki also started this month and will serve as the new Children's and Youth Music Director.
- The HVAC loan is now \$159,018. Teams are again out making Capital Campaign visits.
- Pr. Jeff shared that the block party was a success, with approximately 500 people in attendance. We hosted our first-ever offsite VBS at Lowell in August. The day started a bit slowly with just seven kids, but by 11 a.m., we had about 45 kids. Worship in the Park was a great success. The ribbon cutting at St. Francis House was a great success, and Pr. Jeff thanked the church for that piece of our history.
- Recommendations from the COVID task force were approved: Masks are strongly encouraged to be worn inside the church campus at all times, particularly for those of all ages who are unvaccinated.

Our special offering envelope is in support of Augusta Victoria Hospital (AVH) in Jerusalem. Augusta Victoria Hospital is a program of the Lutheran World Federated Department for World Service (LWF).

The LWF-run Augusta Victoria Hospital in East Jerusalem is a center of medical excellence, serving five million Palestinians in the

West Bank and Gaza. AVH, accredited by the Joint Commission International for its outstanding quality. It offers specialized care that is not available in other hospitals in the West Bank and Gaza, including radiation therapy for cancer patients and pediatric hemodialysis. As you can imagine, the continued



Diabetes Care Center; the Specialized Center for Child Care; and the Skilled Nursing and Long-Term (Sub-Acute) Care Facility. These care centers provide

specialized treatments that are not available in the majority of hospitals in Palestine.

The hospital is also focusing much of its strategic efforts on establishing a palliative care facility as well as a care center for the elderly. This is in line with the hospital's overall strategy to establish health services

otherwise unavailable to the Palestinian community and complements the existing services at the hospital.

In mid-December 2020, Augusta Victoria Hospital was recognized by the Swiss-based International Hospital Federation (IHF) "Beyond the Call of Duty" program for the hospital's outstanding services, efforts, and
